



Red Cross Meets

Trained life savers in the United States, qualified by the Red Cross as experts in all phases of water safety, now number 134,582 adults and juniors, according to the Life Saving Service of the American Red Cross, which reported 32,506 trained and qualified in the past year. This num per does not include other thousands who were taught to swim.

Training courses conducted by the Red Cross last summer brought out uniformly high standard of prosciency. In addition, more than 20 winter training courses were conducted the past year. Swimming "institutes" at camps in Arizona. California, Indiana, Massachusetts New York, North Carolina, Missouri, Oregon, Washington, and Wisconsin. 'splash weeks" and swimming and ife-saving campaigns under Red Cross auspices held in many States arousel great interest.

This does not cover expenditures which continued to be made in the Mississippi Valley flood, or in other disasters originating during the fiscal year but whose operations extended over into the current period.
