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



Grasshopper Plague in California Recalls Sea Gulls' War on Crickets in Utah

SWARMING out of the Tule lake counties in northern California, and spreading into adjacent grain fields are countless armies of grasshoppers! Marching and hopping in almost a solid body, in spite of the efforts of the scores of men at work trying to exterminate them, they are destroying acres and acres of grain. More than 20,000 acres are threatened, according to recent dispatches from this section of the

Harking back in western history one recalls the episode in Zion, the Crickets and the Gulls. It occurred in 1848 when Salt Lake City the earliest settlement in the Rocky Mountains-was less than a year old. The so-called "City" was not even a village at that time; it was more like a camp. It consisted of a log-and-mud fort; enclosing huts, ten's and wagons, with about 1800 inhabitants.

Most of these had followed imnediately after the pioneers, who, with Brigham Young arrived on the shores of the Great Salt Lake, in

Some plowing and planting had been done by the ploneers upon their arrival, but the seeds then put in, did not mature owing to the teness of the season.
