



That was one form of country banking "investigation" as to the ability of a farmer to come through a certain community in the Northwest. In other words, the baker against crop failure and would have a steady cash income despite the whims of weather in the way of trosts, winds, floods, drought and hail. A herd of dairy cows spreads the risk over seven years instead of gambling a year's work and cash outlay on one season's crops. For that reason, it is not surprising to find dairy and poultry products leading the cash income of the U. S. farmer last year with \$3,754,000,000, more than two and a half times the income from grains and nearly three times the income from cotton.

Not only have both dairying and poultry raising had a big expansion since the war because of increased production to meet the increased demand from consumers, but producers have been able to put this form of farming on a better business basis from the start and increase income from unit of stock than is the case with other rops. The Cow Testing Associations have provided an avenue for weeding out losers and breeding up preduction from the highest producers.
