SHAMROCK MERCHANTS STUNG BY STRANGER

Shamrock, June 7.—A man giving the name of Trice Smith and posing as a compiler of city and church directories, sold approximately \$50 worth of advertising that was to appear in a Methodist church directory, collected for it and then beat it.
Following into town Tuesday last week the man applied at The Shamrock Texan office for a job as a circulator. Unsuccessful, he decided to try a city directory and finding there was one under way he tried to promote a "country store" at a local theatre. Again disappointed he conceived the idea of compiling and publishing a church directory, and succeeded in getting the consent of the church.

A member of the church introduced him to several merchants. After selling them ads, the promoter went back the next day, collecting, the church member not being with him. Rev. C. W. Ficke, Methodist pastor, who gave his consent to the directory being published expressed amazement and regret when informed of the fraud. He said he did not investigate the man because he had no idea persons buying advertising from a stranger would pay in

advance.
Postal cards announcing a reward of \$25 would be paid for the man's arrest were printed and mailed to chambers of commerce in West Texas and Oklahoma.
Several persons who were expressed the opinion now would be a good time to revive the advertising committee, created by the Retail Merchants Association for the purpose of investigating every advertising proposition that comes to town. Under this plan all merchants would positively refuse to consider any and all advertising schemes regardless of merit or who was promoting it, until the retail merchants' committee had investigated and reported satisfactorily.
A similar system is used satisfactorily in many larger cities. Such an arrangement, if lived up to, makes persons with worthless schemes steer clear of the city. It means a saving of much time and money to the business man and helps legitimate advertising.—Shamrock Texan.

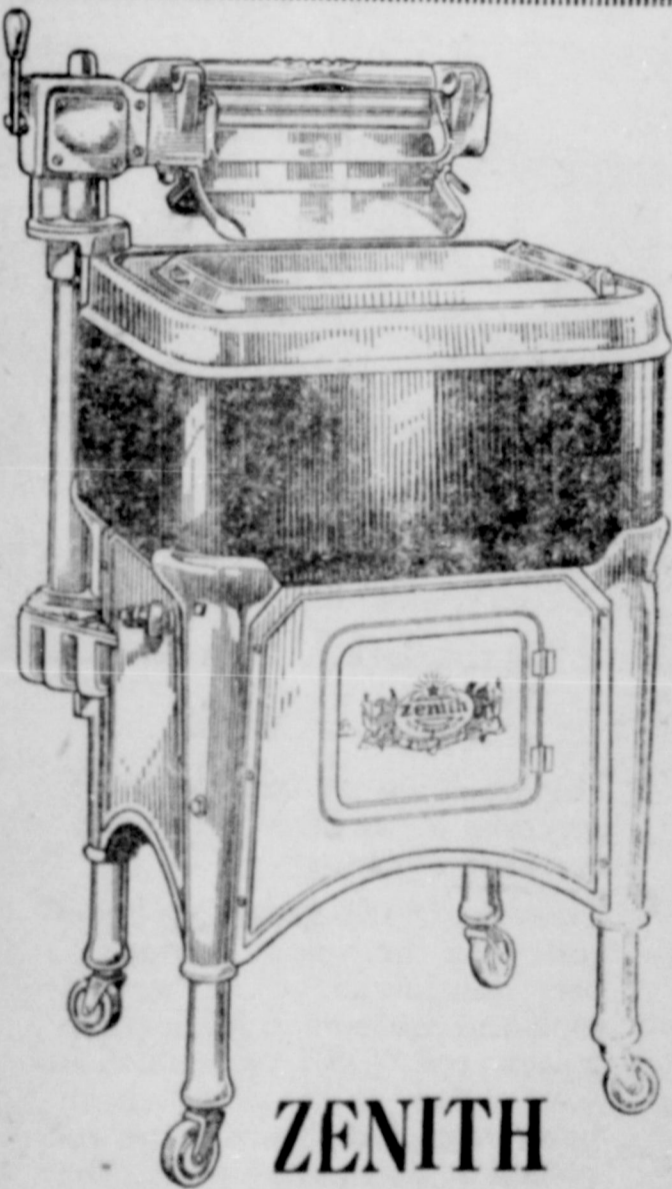

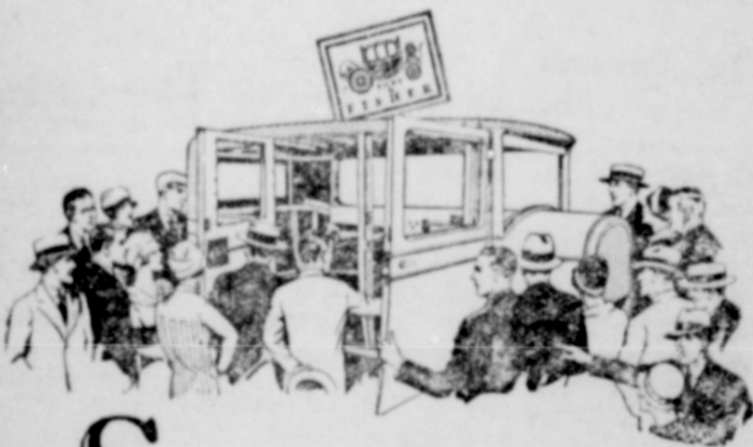
