TELEPHONE MAN LIKES NEWS PRINTING DEPT.

J. H. Wade, lineman for the McLean Telephone Co., in a conversation with the News man one day this week, said he has occasion to notice old telephone directories in his work, and in one home found every directory issued since 1904. These directories, with the exception of last year's edition, were printed in The News plant, and they were in good shape, suitable paper and cover stock being used. Last year's book was a wreck in a very few weeks after being put into use, it being printed on cheap paper with common cardboard backs.

Mr. Wade says the company contemplates issuing new directories soon, but it is not known at this time if they will have them printed at home.

The telephone company, under the present management, has not ordered new directories, but the condition of the various editions mentioned by Mr. Wade can be verified by any user.

The News has always handled the directory job for the advertising, which sometimes paid a profit and sometimes not, but books were put out that would last a year in ordinary use, and if the company has the work done at home this year their patrons may expect a durable, attractive book, with advertisers' names and copy correct in every particular.






Idle Island by Ethel Hueston

Uncle Sam does the biggest business in the world as a job printer, by selling stamped envelopes and printing the return addresses on them, in small or large quantities.

The country newspaper and job printing offices have always protested against this as unfair competition on the part of Uncle Sam, and as taking away a large source of revenue from the smaller printing establishments in the country towns and smaller cities. The National Editorial Association has sent out from the National Office at St. Paul, Minn., a bulletin which reviews this subject and concludes by saying:

"The N. E. A. will continue to fight against unfair government competition by appealing to Congress for relief."

The United States government has no more business printing envelopes than it has selling groceries and wearing apparel. If the government is going into business in competition with private interests, why pass up other lines where there are opportunities of saving money to hundreds of thousands of people, who never

have occasion to utilize this savings on commercial printing?—Shamrock Texan.
