Quarantine Authority Given City Health Officer

The city council has passed an ordinance authorizing the city health and infectious diseases, granting power to make arrests and providing a

Any person who comes from any place infected or believed to be in ious disease will be subject to examination and quarantine.

The city health officer is given full power to enforce the provisions of the ordinance, being vested with the duties and powers of city marshal in this respect.

It is understood that there will be no compulsory vaccination in any case, but the bealth officer may allow vaccination in place of two weeks quarantine. Any person violating the provision







AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING TITY HEALTH OFFICER TO QUAR-TIME ALL CONTAGIOUS AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES, DEFINING SAME, GRANTING CERTAIN POW-MS TO CITY HEALTH OFFICER AND PROVIDING A PENALTY, ETC.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF Mc-LEAN, TEXAS:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the City Health Officer of the City of McLean, Texas, to stop, detain and examine any person coming from any place infected or believed by him to be infected with any infectious or contagious disease or pestilence, and the City Health Officer shall have the authority and it is his duty to quarantine any person who shall be suspected of being infected with any ficer shall have the authority to quarantine any person coming from any place where any person is infected with any such contagious or infectious disease.

Section 2. The City Health Officer shalal have full authority to make reasonable regulations to enforce the provisions of Section 1 hereof to preerve the health and suppress disease in the City of McLean.

Section 3. Every keeper of a hotel, Roby. tfc boarding or lodging house in the City of McLean, in which any inmate hereof shall be sick with any infectious or pestilential disease, shall upon such fact coming to his knowledge, forthwith report the same to the City ricaith Officer. Every physician in he City of McLean shall report, under his hand, to the City Health Officer, the name, residence and discase of every patient whom he shall and harness shop. Cecil Bible. tfc have sick with any infectious or pestilential disease within six hours after he shall have visited such

Section 4. In order to enforce the provisions of this ordinance, the City Realth Officer shall be vested with the authority to make arests and cost is small. 
