Space is the only thing that a newspaper has to sell, and when you want to publicly thank anyone or any organization, if the paper is used it should be paid for. If the paper was the only means, it might be different, but it is always possible to send a committee or the thanks may be extended in person. The use of the newspaper is a kindly custom, as it always gives the donor desirable publicity, but the paper should not be expected to carry thanks for nothing. The same applies to obituaries, resolutions or anything of like nature.

Since it is not customary any more for merchants to 'throw in" a pair of suspenders or socks when you buy a suit or shoes, they do not expect the newspaper to "throw in" a \$5 write-up with a \$2 ad, but oecasionally the editor is asked by those not familiar with modern usages to do so. All this is to say that we have found one tent show man who does not believe in asking for free space. Mr. Names informs us that he never asks for write-ups, but is wiling to pay for all the space he asks for, knowing that space is all the paper has to seil, and if the advertisement will not "pull" the free space will not be worth anything.






