### PANHANDLE PLAINS INC. REPRESENTATIVE HERE

Frank Bennett, financial manager of the Panhandle Plains Incorporation, was a visitor in McLean Monday and Tuesday of this week. Mr. Bennett has just spent two months in Northern states advertising the Panhandle at state fairs. He has visited fairs in Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Wisconsin and Oklahoma. At each fair he was in charge of an exhibit of farm products produced in the Panhandle, which showed what could be produced in Western Texas. In addition to the exhibits being put on by the organization, they are also showing motion pictures of the Panhandle and distributing literature on every phase of the country. The aim of the organization, according to Mr. Bennett, is to induce foreign capital to invest in this country. He was highly elated over the results of the work so far. The Panhandle Plains Incorporation is an organization representing more than 50 counties in West Texas and is financed by contributions from different towns in this territory.

### COTTON REPORT SHOWS INCREASE GRAY CO.

According to the government cotton report released last Friday, Gray county shows a total of 1,560 bales ginned this season as against 1,209 for the corresponding period last year. Wheeler county 6,933 against 6,979; Donley 6,734 against 6,140; Collingsworth 15,522 against 121,600. The total for this state was 2,817,414 against 3,339,807.

### Commissioners Disapprove Bill Oil Assessments

While no definite action could be taken at commissioners court Monday, due to the absence of Messrs. Cox and White, the members present went on record as strongly disapproving a bill for \$7,750 submitted for assessing oil properties in Gray county. Judge Duncan expressed dissatisfaction when it was announced that the valuation of oil property in the county for this year is \$15,929,110, as against \$8,313,323 last year. The Dallas company making the assessment is allowed 5% of the total rendition for their work, but each of the commissioners present thought the bill too large, and told the representative of the company that it would be investigated before being approved. Commissioner Cox was present for the first of the session and he and Commissioners Kirby and Newman approved the tax rolls of Assessor F. E. Leech. The total valuation of the county is \$21,000,291.79, a gain of about 8 million dollars over last year. In expressing opinion on the \$7,750 bill for assessing oil property, the court took the stand that there are members of the equalization board and commissioners capable of giving a fair rendition. If the bill is paid it must come from the general funds of the county.

### BOY SCOUT EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AT MEMPHIS

The executive committee of the Southeast Panhandle Area Council, Boy Scouts, met in Memphis Sunday to discuss the work of the area. Mr. E. E. Voss of the regional office was present and discussed the old Panhandle council and the taking over of Camp Warner by this area. The budget was gone into and adopted, and the annual meeting set for Tuesday, January 7, in Memphis. This meeting will be a sort of conventional type, with the council meeting in the afternoon to determine the policies for 1930, and a banquet in the evening, to which the ladies will be invited. There will be plenty of scouting atmosphere and demonstrations and a good talk on scouting.

### OFFICE BUILDING ERECTED

#### Postoffice Will Be in New Building on North Main

A new building is being erected on North Main street, next door to the S. M. Hodges Furniture Co., for the postoffice. The new building will be 23 feet and 10 inches wide by 62 feet and 6 inches long, inside measurement, and will have ordinary double sash windows in front. There will be 530 boxes installed, and the furniture, boxes, etc., will be of good finish. The postoffice department has signed a 10 year lease on the building and equipment, and the building should be ready for occupancy about the first of the year. Postmaster John B. Vannoy says that he hopes the patrons of the office will be patient with the postoffice force when they move, as the boxes, numbers and arrangement will all be different and everything will have to be learned over. S. O. Cook of Dallas is owner of the building and Chas. E. Cooke contractor and builder.

**"UP IN THE AIR"**

By the Radio Editor  
"I shortened my aerial this spring, and it hasn't been used during the summer—"

Answer: Usually the instructions supplied with a radio set are the safest guide as to the length of the aerial. However, districts far from broadcast stations of any strength may permit antenna lengths up to 175 feet with no noticeable increase in station interference. An antenna of this length will at times make possible good daylight reception when a shorter aerial will not. No matter how sharp turning a set may be interference cannot be avoided in the lower wave bands due to the fact that there are in some instances 10 to 15 stations operating simultaneously on a single band. Occasionally also, some of the more important stations not yet equipped with Piezo crystal control may be operated somewhat off their designated wave band, and set up a heterodyn whistle with the station on whose channel they are infringing.

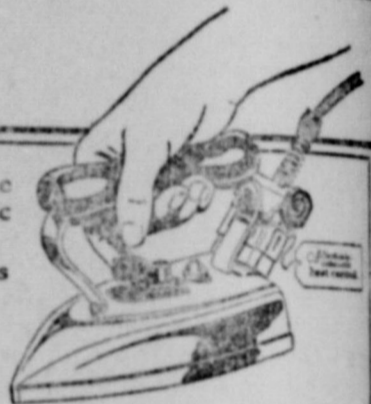

**SIGNBOARDS DOOMED**

A storm of public opinion now brewing may sweep the unsightly billboard or advertising sign from the roadside of main thoroughfares in this country. Up to this time they have been multiplying in numbers, but there are indications that the public is soon to register a protest that will go far to abolition of these eyesores and vision breakers.

The roadside signboard has a certain advertising value and the public neither envies the advertiser for his profit from it nor does it desire to deprive the advertiser of any business advantage, but the highways are primarily for the benefit and pleasure of the people, and the advertising sign detracts from those benefits and pleasures.

Motorists find the posterboard obnoxious for the three reasons that it mars the landscape, obstructs the views of the scenery and creates a hazard by interference with the vision of the driver. All are sufficiently valid reasons why the advertising sign should be prohibited along main highways.

In the early days of the automobile the roadside poster board was limited to circus posters on barn broadsides and motorists never dreamed of them as a future problem of highway administration. Public opinion then could not have molded against the signboard. Today it is molding itself and may strike any time.

When the advertiser finds that his signboards are distasteful to the public he will not wait, if he is wise, until the passage of legislation before he removes them.—Paducah Post.

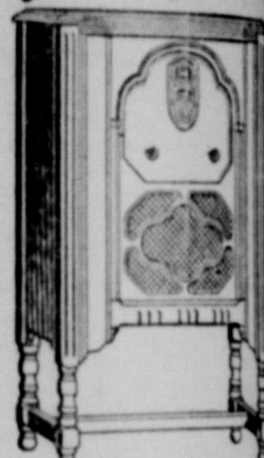
