Tom Rose, chairman of the Pampa chamber of commerce road commitlee, presided at the meeting, and as large map of the proposed roads was placed beside the speaker and every press an opinion. All who spoke were in favor of a county-wide issue, provided an equitable plan could be worked out. It was brought out that McLean and Alanreed citizens would have their tax rate reduced about 60 c under the county-wide plan, over the more paved road than is contemplated <br> Estimates of costs on a tentative plan complled by P. S. Bailey, dis trict engineer, and approved by Gibb Gilchrist, chief engineer, are as follows <br> Highway No. 33, 16.5 miles, con crete, $\$ 552,500$; county's share, $\$ 184$. 100 . Highway No, 33-A, 23 miles, as- phalt, $\$ 458,000 ;$ county's share, $\$ 229$;000. Highway No. 88, 24.5 miles, as- phalt, $\$ 357,000 ;$ county's share, $\$ 178,-$ 000. <br> Highway No. 66, 12.5 miles, con- crete, $\$ 393,000 ;$ county's share, $\$ 191$, <br> 000 <br> Total state highways, 76 miles, $\$ 1$, 760,$500 ;$ county's share, $\$ 722,600$. To this was added $\$ 67,400$ for preparation of plans for purchasing rights- of-ways $\qquad$ Borger road, 4.5 miles, $\$ 81,000$, as- phalt; Miami, 2.5 miles, $\$ 45,000$; Le-fors-McLean, $\mathbf{\$ 4 5 0 , 0 0 0}$.
