The reduction in salary should be sufficient to eliminate the chief cause for whatever opposition Mr. Smithman has had. In fact, practically all criticism of Mr. Spence's predecessor has not been aimed personally at him or his handling of affairs but at his salary.

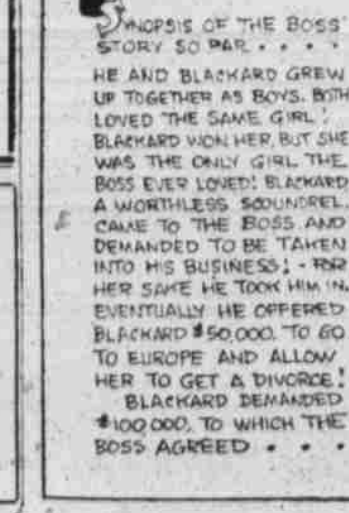

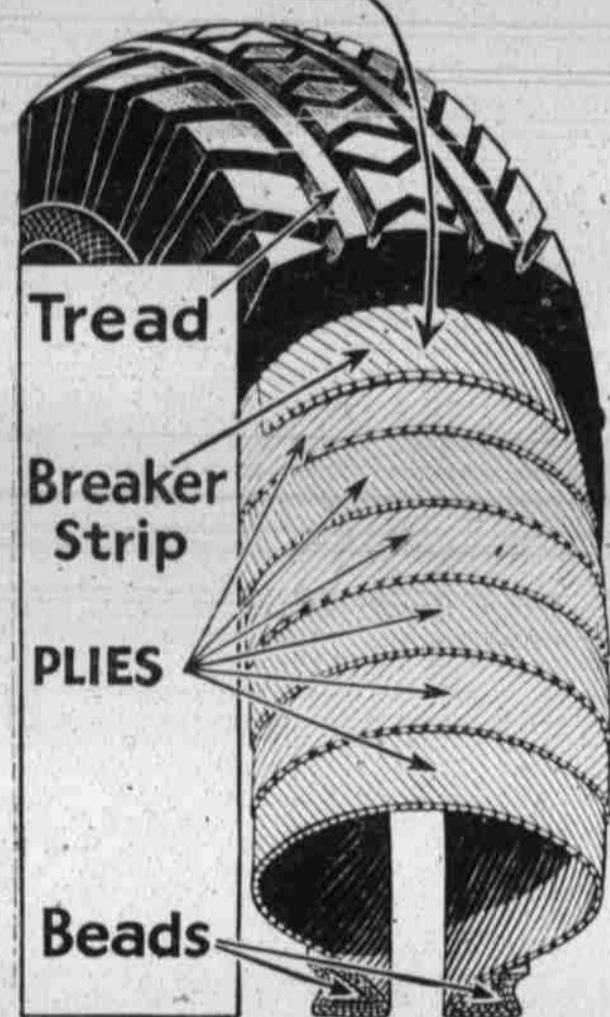

Note that the average weight of this manufacturer's "second line" tire is one pound five ounces heavier than the average weight of his "first line" tire. The Real Sufferers

IN DESPERATION many oil people are shutting down their wells. They are so low on the market that it is profitable to operate.

That may have the desired effect of bringing the price of oil per barrel up to a level with the price of gasoline per gallon.

But it doesn't answer one of the most vital questions connected with this agitation over the oil situation: What is to become of the thousands of workers who will be laid off, out of jobs, if the wells are all shut down?

Already there are many oil field workers out of employment in this country. The ranks of the unemployed will be multiplied many times if the shut-down orders reach the proportions some observers seem to expect.

Well, maybe it could be worse. We are told that four hundred thousand pickers will be needed in the fields of Texas within a few weeks.

The pay will be small and the work hard, but a hungry man with hungry children depending on him, is not inclined to be fussy about the type of employment offered him.

Let us hope some magic formula will be found to cure the ills of the oil industry without the necessity of shutting down the wells.

Carter Glass on the Warpath

HOW'S your HEALTH

Chronic Constipation In people otherwise normal, chronic constipation can be cured without medication or any kind of diet, abundant fluid intake and by acquiring the proper habit.

The diet should consist of plenty of food that contains roughage. Fruit should be generously added. Liberal quantities of water must be taken, and at least one glass before retiring and before breakfast.

Patients should choose a time either before or after breakfast, say five or ten minutes, and daily at this time they should try to have a stool movement, whether there is any desire or not.

Even if there is no movement at first for three or four days, they should not take cathartics, if absolutely necessary, a mineral oil or an enema may be taken.

TEMPLE, Texas, July 21 (AP)—Several new drilling projects have stimulated oil wildcatting in Bell county. E. A. Field and L. A. Long of San Antonio and Austin obtained a block of acreage north of the Taylor's Valley road, opposite the Daisy Reed well. They spudded in an eight-inch hole June 29 and expected to complete the test late in July.

C. E. Hartman, driller of the Daisy Reed well, which began to show oil early this year as it got down to 900 feet as a water well, has started a new test on the Deavers farm, 500 feet west of the Reed No. 1 well. It was reported that two other tests were to be made in this area soon. The Milten well on the John Edds farm had neared an interesting stage and the Merrick ranch well near Jarrell was reported showing some oil and gas.

Rotation of Truck Crops Best Way To Fight Disease

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, July 21 (AP)—The best way to invite diseases of truck crops is to grow the same crops on the same land year in and year out, says Dr. J. J. Taubenhaus, chief of the division of plant pathology, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Crop rotation is just as important in truck farming as in growing field and fruit crops and constitutes a chief method of controlling disastrous diseases, he says.

Many truck crop diseases are carried with the seed. Dr. Taubenhaus points out, and adds that 'many of these may be eliminated by using disease-free seed and by seed treatment with organic mercuries or other dips made of mercuric chloride or formaldehyde.' Descriptions of the common Texas truck crop diseases and outlines for their control will be given on the horticultural program at the Farmers' Short Course at Texas A. & M. College the last week in July. Another feature will be the presentation of a new and revolutionary method of controlling plant lice on truck crops as worked out by J. N. Roney of the entomological laboratories of the experiment station at Dickinson.

Mrs. C. H. Winslow of Pasquotank county, North Carolina, raised 299 chicks out of 300 hatched. The per capita debt of Mississippi in 1930 was \$11.86.

Bandit Dies, Two Injured, In Gun Fight

CHANUTE, Kas., July 21 (UP)—One bandit suspect was killed and two others were injured here today in a gun battle with a Chanutte policeman. The three men were shot by Patrolman H. S. Nelson, when they refused to stop their car. Nelson shot a tire on the car, bringing it to a halt. The four men started to shoot at Nelson, but he wounded three in rapid succession.

Year's Interscholastic League Debate Topic Deals With Lobbying

AUSTIN, Texas, July 21 (AP)—Selection of the debate topic for interscholastic league contests in 1931-32 has been made by the league directors. The topic is "Resolved: That Lobbying is Generally Practiced in This Country to the Detriment of the Best Interest of the People."

Approximately 17,000 copies of the revised constitution and rules of the league will be issued August 1st.

Texas Exports Down Less Than Million

WASHINGTON, July 21 (UP)—Texas exports in 1930 were valued at \$506,682,298 as compared with \$517,539,600 the previous year, statistics released today by the department of commerce revealed. Texas ranked second among all states in the union in value of foreign shipments. It was preceded only by New York with exports totaling \$688,659,077.

Unmanufactured cotton, valued at \$301,655,127, led export products from Texas last year. Cotton was followed by gasoline, which totaled \$79,342,929; wheat, \$23,261,946; and illuminating oil, \$18,183,390.

CONSCIENCE DEBT PAID AFTER 37 YEARS

CHESTER, Pa. (INS)—The dying wish of a debtor was fulfilled here when his granddaughter paid \$7 to the surviving heir of a merchant from whom he had purchased two blankets 37 years ago without paying for them. In 1894, Nathan Berry operated a general store at Shoemakerville, Quarry township, purchased their needs from him, frequently without cash. One was a workman known as 'Flaherty.' He bought the two blankets one day and left the village before pay-day came. Berry charged the debt off to human fickleness; but Flaherty never forgot.

When he died recently in Atlantic City, N. J., he begged that she seek the living heir surviving Berry and pay over to them the \$7 owing. The granddaughter conducted a weary search until she learned that Benjamin Berry, a mail carrier here, was the only surviving heir. Just recently, Benjamin delivered to himself the letter with a check for \$7 inclosed.

MODERN HEALTH CLINIC IN SPARSE SETTLEMENT

MARQUETTE, Mich. (INS)—A complete and modern health clinic such as no other area so sparsely settled may boast is one of the valuable assets of Michigan Upper Peninsula. The clinic, just opened, is one of the several direct results of the \$10,000,000 Children's Fund of Michigan, dedicated by Senator James Couzens to child welfare. The new unit is designed to give to children in the more remote districts the same services available to those in urban centers. Specialists will diagnose cases brought from all sections of the northern peninsula and at the same time will demonstrate to physicians in the area the most advanced methods of treating special ailments.

The clinic is the result of cooperation of the Children's Fund, St. Luke's Hospital of Marquette, and the post-graduate department of the University of Michigan Medical school. A decrease of 40 per cent in tobacco acreage has been reported from sections of Wayne county, North Carolina.

U., called on Governor Ross Sterling today and commended him on his intention to submit congressional redistricting at the present special session of the legislature. Afterward, Mrs. Watts said all district presidents of the W. C. T. U. joined with her in her commendation. Each district president represents a congressional district.

"The W. C. T. U. realizes this is a vitally important matter," Mrs. Watts said. "Re-districting would assure the prohibition patriots a fair chance of electing dry men. It is the only just and democratic preparation for the election of our new congressmen."

"The W. C. T. U. is confident the governor will submit the matter and that the legislature will pass the necessary measure," Mrs. Watts concluded.

### State Tax Board Meets; Ad Valorem Rate Is Not Fixed

AUSTIN, July 21 (UP)—The state automobile tax board met here today but adjourned without fixing the ad valorem tax rate for the ensuing fiscal year. The board adjourned until such time as Comptroller George H. Sheppard has estimates ready on revenue and expenditures for next year. Members of the board are Gov. Ross Sterling, State Treasurer Charley Lockhart and Sheppard.

### Mother Of Man Held For Murder Gives Her Version

DALLAS, July 21 (UP)—Mrs. Ed Smith, who last week spent a day in jail because of her refusal to testify before the grand jury, went before the probing body and told what she knew of the shooting June 14 which resulted in the death of Miss Helen Ruth Lamar, 19. Mrs. Smith's son, Elmo Berry, is charged with the girl's murder.

### Governor Issues General Parole

AUSTIN, July 21 (UP)—After serving nine years of a 25-year sentence for robbery and robbery by assault, Tom Lane was granted a general parole today by Gov. Ross Sterling. Lane was convicted in Stephens county, in March, 1922. The assistant district attorney who prosecuted Lane recommended clemency, saying, "no one was hurt and but little money obtained."

### Martial Law Invoked In Peiping, Tientsin

PEIPING, China, July 21 (UP)—Martial law was declared in Peiping and Tientsin, nearby port of North China, as a precautionary measure against persistent reports of a rising rebel movement. The city here was quiet.

Rebellion in North China, indicated in the martial law dispatch from Peiping, apparently was aimed at overthrow of Marshal Chang Hsueh-liang, young Manchurian leader now in control of the Peiping-Tientsin area.

The young general, as he is known, is sympathetic to the national government at Nanking, and has governed Northern China and his own three provinces of Manchuria under an agreement with Nanking.

### Prohibition 'Increasingly Beneficial,' Says Miss Booth

Evangeline Booth, commander of the Salvation Army, speaking before the Presbyterian General Assembly, in Pittsburgh, had nothing but praise for prohibition. As reported in The New York Times she declared that "With whatever false reasoning, the fact remains that with the inception of prohibition, nine-tenths of the drunkenness in this country disappeared. You ask why I say it. I say it because I know it."

The reports of 5000 officers of the Salvation Army from all parts of the country, showed that children were happier and brighter today than before prohibition. She said, "The Eighteenth Amendment is increasingly an overwhelming benefit."

She asserted that before prohibition, 50 per cent of the nation's alcoholic consumption was in beer and that if beer were to be legalized it would bring back nine-tenths of the pre-prohibition amount of drinking.

"I have been asked to modify my views," she went on. "I modify: my views? In so doing I should be violating one of the most sacred traditions of the Salvation Army," explaining that its founder, her father, had begun his work by "denouncing liquor at the doors of one of the vilest public houses in London's slums."

"War is not responsible for one-half the broken homes and shattered spirits that have been caused by alcoholism," she said.

What Would "More Drinking" Signify? Supposing there was more drinking among any class now than ever before what would that signify? It would mean that now our young people are weaker-willed, more wishy-washy in character, more easily influenced by their superiors. It would mean that older folk are less scrupulous and take greater pleasure in the depraving of the morals of the young with whom they come in contact. I don't believe it is so. I regard this talk about the greater amount of drinking today as coming from the joy killer and the sporting men and being relayed by those who patronize or make a profit on these classes.

When one studies the effects of alcohol scientifically, there is but one conclusion possible, and that is absolute teetotalism is the best policy, indeed the only consistent policy for any one who wants to get the most out of life.

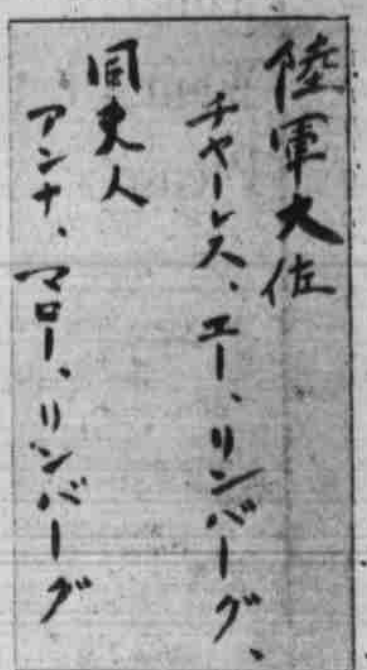

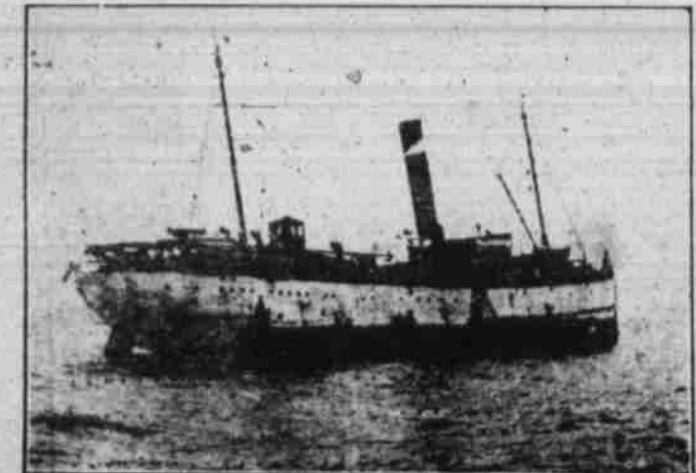

The geyser of flame was quenched yesterday within 15 minutes when water was pumped through six-inch openings into the casing 25 feet below the surface. The wild flow of oil was then checked by pumping mud through the openings.

The men marched behind an American flag, and were led by the Rev. C. W. Holmes. Approximately 10,000 persons in this section are in need of relief, it was estimated.

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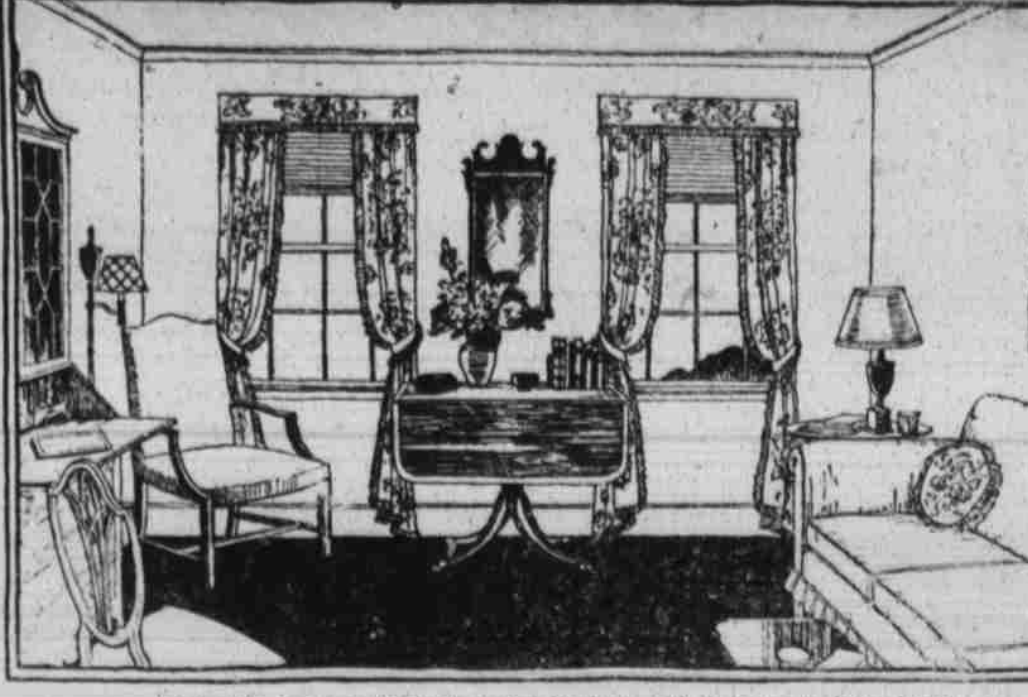
