They have a high fat content in ified forms that are easy to digest.

One egg yields about 70 calories, if all of it is burned as fuel. About 45 calories are derived from the fat and 25 calories from the protein. In a well-balanced diet, the protein is used for tissue building and not for fuel.

Eggs contain practically no carbohydrates, and hence should be eaten with potatoes, bread, or other starchy fuel food.

Eggs leave an acid ash and so should be eaten with something that leaves an alkaline ash. An apple, an orange, a tomato, or a potato for every egg eaten maintains a good mineral balance.
