At the hospital he would be replaced by the corpse of a common soldier, executed that morning and dressed in the uniform of the marshal, while his escape to America would be facilitated by way of Bor denux. So it would therefore appear that all the individual evidence in the mystery of Marshal Ney points in one direction, toward the fact that his tory is mistaken when it declares that Michel Ney was executed on Decemher 5, 1815, and that he really died in South Carolina, thirty-one years later. But, even granting this, there is still one more question which remains unanswered: Why, if Peter Ney and Michel Ney were one and the same, did not the former marshal of France return to his native country when full and complete amnesty was granted to all political exiles?
