**END OF FIRST SIX WEEKS**

The end of the first six weeks has come and it is time for grade cards. These cards were printed by The McLean News and they are very adequate. Each parent should be interested in seeing his child's report card, for that is the way he can check up on the work that his child is doing. The grades are carefully kept and averaged by each teacher. It is very important that these cards be kept, therefore the teachers are asking the parents to be prompt in signing the cards and having the children to return them. It is important for every parent to examine the cards to see if his child is doing the best work that he can.

The grades are, as near as possible, assembled according to the following five point division system. The word statement of what the letters stand for are kept in mind by the teachers.

Grade A—Superior. 1 scholarship, strong, exceeding the requirement of the instructor. 2 initiative, contributions exceeding the assignment,

showing independent resourcefulness. 3 attitude, positive benefit to class. 4 co-operation, forwarding all group activities, constant and spontaneous. 5 individual improvement marked and growing.

Grade B—Good—above average. 1 scholarship, accurate and complete, meeting all requirements of instructor. 2 initiative, good when stimulated by some desirable achievement. 3 attitude, proper and beneficial to group. 4 co-operation, good in group work. 5 individual improvement, showing marks of improvement.

Grade C—Average. 1 scholarship, barely meeting assignments. 2 initiative, uncertain and apparent only at times. 3 attitude, generally neutral but not objectionable. 4 co-operation, not positive nor very effective, and irregular. 5 individual improvement, very ordinary, definite marks lacking.

Grade D—Below average. 1 scholarship, not meeting all assignments and requirements of instructor. 2 initiative, lacking. 3 attitude, indifferent. 4 co-operation, fair at times and lacking at other times. 5 individual improvement, not noticeable.

Grade F—Failing. Work unsatisfactory and is failing grade and hence not defined.

We hope that you will study this table and if your child is not doing the work that you want him to, that you will co-operate with the teacher, find out the trouble, and get it corrected.

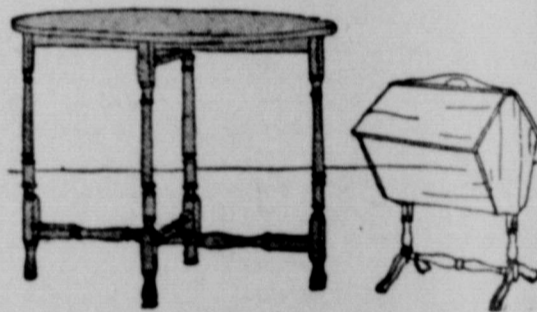

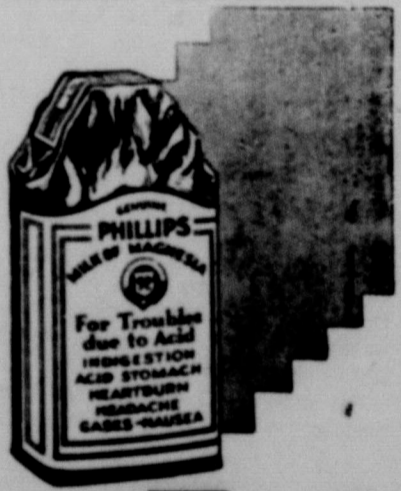

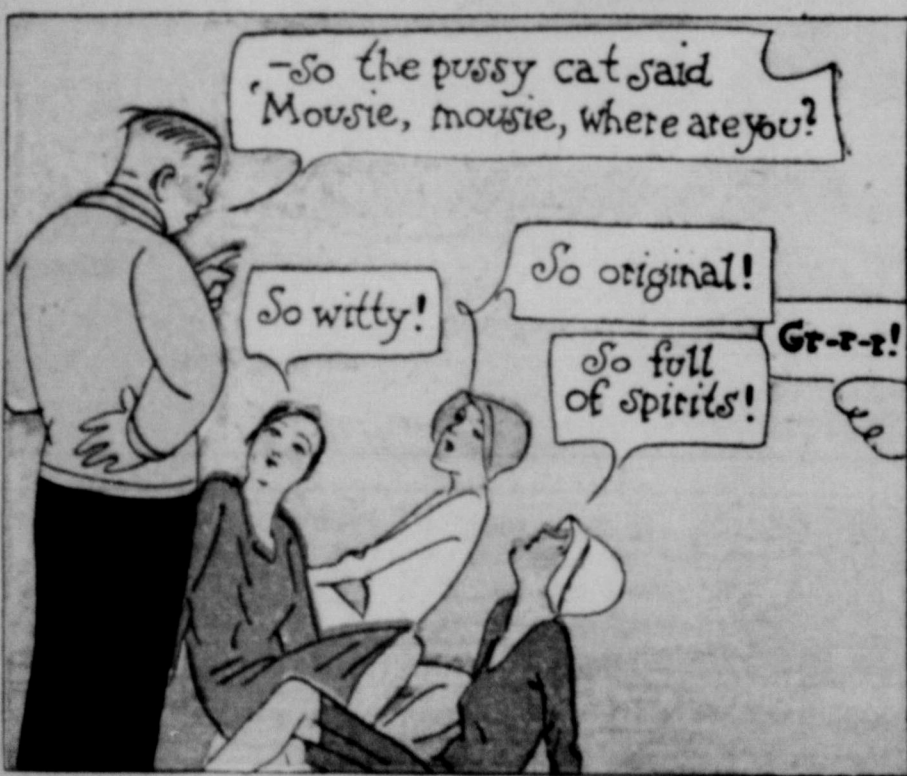

**Sunday's Lesson**

**IN CORINTH, Acts 18:1-11**

Close of the lesson we find Paul and his ever-ready companions in Berea. The Bereans both were searchers of Scriptures and accepting of the Christian nucleus was fast. Word of the success of the Jews of Thessalonica immediately sent representatives to "stir up" the people. Paul left for Berea while Silas and Timothy re-

ached Athens alone. He preached in that city of philosophy. He was invited to the place where they might gather. Paul brought that message of Athens which is considered a failure. One expects that group of Stoic philosophers to be so quickly won over by the recently organized Christian nucleus. There was a saved, however, under Paul's preaching, whether philosophers or not. Paul reached Athens with Silas and Timothy who had accompanied him. They were Jews whose home was in Rome until Claudius had commanded all Jews to leave the city. Aquila was a tent maker and probably employed Paul in his work. Paul was made by trade. So far as is known he and his wife were not Jews, but before long Paul had them the way of life. Paul preached in the synagogue on the Sabbath day. But the necessity of manual labor for his livelihood reduced his testimony in that he had no time to give to the Jews. Finally Silas and Timothy, however, and with them came the Christians in Macedonia. Paul offered to Paul (1 Thes. Cor. 11:9, Phil. 4:15) which led him to drop his tent making and give his full time to the preaching of the Gospel. Up until that time there had been no trouble with his work. But as soon as he began to preach to the Gentiles, trouble began. The opposition was so strong among the Jews that Paul left them and turned to the Gentiles. He found a place to preach in the house of Justus, next door to the synagogue, and continued his work. Not long after this move by Paul, Crispus, the chief ruler of the synagogue, with his whole family believed and were baptized. This was a great triumph for the Jews, so Sosthenes was made ruler of the synagogue they took Paul and him before Gallio, deputy of the province, accusing him of teaching "men to worship God contrary to the law." For Gallio knew what law meant, and not only refused to judge in the matter, but censured them. And when he had done this, he drove them from the judgment. The Greeks took Sosthenes and him before the judgment seat. Gallio cared for none of these things. Thus Paul, from the standpoint of the government, had a chance of protection, according to God's promise. He knew Paul's need and spoke to him. He had had a trying time. Sosthenes he barely escaped with his life (Acts 9:24, 25). He was not stoned in Jerusalem (Acts 9:26). He was driven from Antioch of Pisidia (Acts 13:50). He was stoned in Lystra (Acts 14:5). In Lystra he was stoned and left for dead (Acts 14:19). He was beaten and put in prison at Philippi (Acts 16:23). In Thessalonica, Jason and other Christians were forced to make bond to him out of the city (Acts 17:9). He was forced to leave Berea because of an uprising (Acts 17:13, 14). In Athens the Jews were out to land in prison or possibly kill him. He needed aid. Where is there an servant of God who would have

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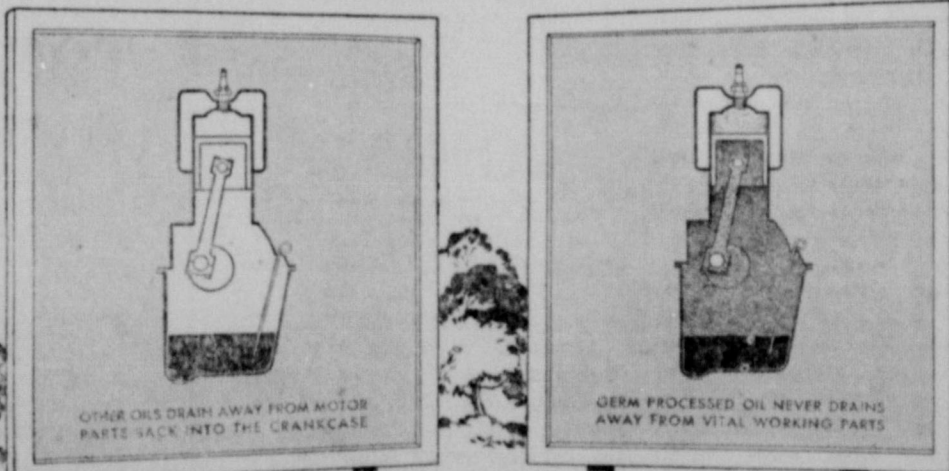
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
