#### Gas Company Franchise May Be Revoked

On account of failure to pay their franchise tax, the McLean Gas Co may forfeit its right to operate in McLean, according to action taken by the city council in session last

The following letter addressed to the company explains in detail the situation:

Dear Sirs:

Grasshoppers are already beginning to appear in the southeastern part of Gray county, and farmers should apply poison as soon as possible to save the crops that are just coming up, according to County Agent Thom-

Poison bran mash has been highly successful in fighting grasshoppers and this has become the standard control meaure, the county agent states. The formula he gives consists of 25 pounds coarse wheat bran. 1 pound Paris green or white arsenic. ounce high grade smyl acetate (avoid cheap grades of banana oil or bronzing liquids), 2 quarts cane or sorghum molasses, 1 pound common salt, and enough water to make a moist mash.

Mix the bran and poison together thoroughly, dilute the amyl acetate and molasses in 2 gallons of water. Pour this liquid over the mixture of poison and bran until every particle is moist. Make further additions of water and mix thoroughly until a mash is obtained that is quite moist, yet will fall apart after being tightly squeezed. ELECTION NOTICE

CITY OF McLEAN WHEREAS, a petition has been presented to the City Council of McLean, Texas, praying that an election be held in the City of McLean, Texas, for the purpose of submitting to a vote of qualified voters therein the question of whether or not a municipal gas system may be installed by the City of McLean.
