J. M. Carpenter is hereby appointe presiding officer of said election, and he shall select two judges to assist in holding the same.

Only qualified property taxpayin voters of the City of McLean, Texas shall be entitled to vote at said election. Those who favor the proposition shall have written or printed of their ballots the words "For the payment of a city tax for the purpose of maintaining a band." Those opposed shall have written or printed on the' ballots the words "Against the pay-






