In the meantime, the patient should be kept warm and protected from shock by covering him with a blanket, an overcoat or anything else that will serve Saturday. the purpose.

#### Break Should Be Splinted

If it is advisable to remove the victim to some more favorable place, the parts in which broken bones are suspected should be temporarily splinted. Most any suitable object that is at hand can be made to serve as a splint for temporary use. Such things as a board, a broom handle, a cane, in McLean Tuesday. an umbrella, or pieces from wreckage of automobiles or railway coach-

Guard Against Additional Injury

If possbile, the injured person should be placed on a padded plank or something else that will serve as a stretcher on which to carry him, particularly if a hip, a leg, an ankle, or vertebræ are broken. Lifting and carrying should be done with the greatest care to protect the injured

The important thing to remember in giving first aid to people who have broken bones is to take every pre-
