Majority **Gives City Gas Plant**

Little Interest Shown in Election Tuesday

With a vote of 218 for and 18 against, the voters of McLean gave the city council the right to install a municipal owned gas plant, at the special election held Tuesday. Little interest was manifested in the election, most of the voting being done in the afternoon. The city council distributed circulars urging citizens to vote for the proposition. the day before the election, but the McLean Gas Company apparently made no effort in any way to influence voters.

Under the terms of the election the council is empowered to put in a plant, which is expected to be done before next winter, unless satisfactory terms are arranged with the Mc-Lean Gas Company.

The city has asked the gas com pany to show reasons why their charter should not be revoked, on account of a delinquent annual payment of charter fees, and the gas company attorney has filed a brief with the city answering the charge This brief is now in the hands of the city attorneys for an opinion.

The city won the case before the State Railroad Commission, but the gas company held up the decision



Next Sunday's Lesson JACOB THE AGED FATHER

By Rev. Cecil G. Goff Golden text, Ex. 20:12. Lesson text Gen. 46:1-7, 28-30; 47:7.

Last Sunday we studied concerning Judah's powerful appeal to Joseph for his broether, Benjamin. Joseph's servant had placed the master's silver cup in Benjamin's bag of grain by command. Joseph sent after the brothers and had the guilty one brought back. He proposed to keep Benjamin as his servant. But Judah had pledged his father that the younger boy would return. Judah offered to take the boy's place of servitude

Joseph was so touched by the plea that he caused all to leave the room save his brothers, and made himself known to them. One can scarcely conceive of the embarrassment of the brothers who had sold him into slavery and had been claiming to him that he was dead. Joseph was so overcome with joy and the grace of God that he set his brothers at ease. His anxiety was for the care of his father and brethren. So great was Joseph's concern and anxiety to see his father that he sent for him that he might dwell in the land of Egypt. He sent not only all of his brothers home, but also sent large amounts of supplies and wagons to bring back Jacob and his possessions.

When the sons returned they told their father all that had happened, but he would not believe them. For years he had believed Joseph deadnow his sons come confessing their deception and bringing Joseph's invitation as second ruler of all Egypt to come and dwell with him in a land of plenty. It was not until Jacob saw the supplies and wagons that he believed.

v. 1. Jacob was at Hebron. The family packed all they had and took all of their possessions and started for Egypt. When they reached Beer-Sheba they stopped for the purpose of offering sacrifice to Jehovah. Jacob, since the night he first received God's promises, had worshiped Him, and especially since the night he spent with the angel of God.


v. 2-4. As Jacob worshiped Jehovah, He spoke to his servant. God announced to Jacob that He was present. No doubt Jacob had had fears concerning his moving to Egypt but now God bids him go. THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS **MUST DECIDE THE FATE OF TEXAS RAILROADS**

• THE WELFARE of Texas and Texans has gone and will always go hand in hand with the welfare of Texas railroads. Their dependency upon each other is absolute.

In 1929 Texas railroads gave employment to 82,956 employes, to whom they paid annually \$126,674,543 in salaries and wages. In 1930 this number decreased to 70,739 while the payroll declined to \$109,892,226. In 1931 the number of employes fell to 57,098 and the payroll to \$89,505,918.

This represents a decrease of more than \$37,000,000 in purchasing power in Texas communities. There has been a corresponding decrease in purchase of materials and supplies by Texas railroads. The ability to have maintained railroad payrolls and purchases would have been a very important factor in overcoming the present trying economic condition.

The decline in railroad payrolls and purchases is due only in part to economic conditions. The revenues of the railroads have been affected not only by business conditions but to a very large extent by loss of traffic to trucks and buses using the public highways in competition with the railroads.

> • The time has come when the people of Texas must decide whether the traffic of this state can best be carried by the railroads, soing facilities which they built and maintain at their own expense, or by trucks and buses using the highways built and maintained at the taxpayers' expense.






