## THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS MUST DECIDE THE FATE OF TEXAS RAILROADS

- THE WElfare of Texas and Texans has gone and will always go hand in hand with the welfare of Texas railroads. Their dependency upon each other is absolute.
In 1929 Texas railroads gave employment to 82,956 employes, to whom they paid annually $\$ 126,674,543$ in salaries and wages. In 1930 this number decreased to 70,739 while the payroll declined to $\$ 109,892,226$. In 1931 the number of employes fell to 57,098 and the payroll to \$89,505,918.
This represents a decrease of more than $\$ 37,000,000$ in purchasing power in Texas communities. There has been - corresponding decrease in purchase of materials and supplies by Texas railroads. The ability to have main tained railroad payrolls and purchases would have been a very important factor in overcoming the present trying economic condition.
The decline in railroed payrolls and purchases is due enly in part to economic conditions. The revenues of the railroads have been affected not only by business conditiona but to a very large extent by loss of traffic to trucko and buses using the public highways in competition with the railroeds.
- The time has come when the people of Texas mant decide whether the traffic of this otate can beat be carried by the railroads, moing facilities which they beilt and maintain at their own expense, or by trachs aad beses using the highoays bailt and mainatain.d at the toxpayers' expense.
