### Tigers Will Play Shamrock Irishmen Here Friday

#### Semi-Final Contest on Local Field

#### Tigers Have Winning Streak All Season

Following all games played this season, the McLean Tigers will meet Shamrock Irishmen from Shamrock on the local gridiron Friday afternoon.

The game will be one of the semi-final games of class B schools in district 2, the other being played the same day between the Hereford Redaces and the Canyon Eagles, Hereford.

The Tigers, under the coaching of B. Rush, former San Marcos Teachers College star, have made a national season, and tomorrow's game is expected to attract over a thousand people from all over the district.

The Tigers won a non-conference game from Shamrock earlier in the season, but they expect to meet some competition from the visiting team in the coming game.

It has been some years since McLean has had a winning team, and the fans are enthusiastic over the team made by the Tigers this year. Shamrock is expected to bring over 1,000 fans to the game, and local people are urged to attend in a body help root for the home team.

#### McLEAN F. A. A. TEAM AT KANSAS CITY

The McLean team of vocational agriculture students are attending the Kansas City Royal Livestock Show this week, where they are representing the State of Texas in the national meat judging contest. The contest consists of identifying 25 commercial and wholesale cuts of meat from beef, veal, pork and mutton.

The members of the team are Bert Carpenter, Erwin Browning, Clyde Andrews and Lavelle Christian, accompanied by John Harding, principal of the high school. Dr. A. A. Tampke, instructor of vocational agriculture, gave the boys careful training and coaching the past two months.

Of five amusement halls in Gray county against which injunctions have been asked, only one had not been restrained by district court order Saturday. The one was at Lefors, and it was to be considered soon.

The injunctions order the managers and operators to "desist and refrain from using said room, hall, building, and premises or any part thereof as a pool hall or place where pool and billiards or similar games can be played with balls and cues as said pool hall is defined by the laws of the State of Texas."

The temporary injunctions were granted by Judge W. R. Ewing. They affect only use of the buildings as prohibited by state laws.

#### Legion Program Armistice Day Best Seen Here

"The best program ever given on Armistice Day," was the verdict of those who attended the exercises at the high school auditorium Friday morning of last week.

The program was in charge of Post Commander Carl O. Greene, and the Legion members gathered down town and marched, following the colors, to the school building where the opening was given as suggested in the American Legion manual.

Following a number by the high school band under the direction of Prof. Robt. C. Davidson, J. H. Bodine gave the invocation, and Commander Greene opened the program. T. J. Turner, Reep Landers, Jack Roberts and Mr. Greene made short talks, after which T. W. Gilstrap of Amarillo, former McLean citizen and member of the post, presented Major Caldwell of Amarillo as the speaker of the day.

Major Caldwell glorified the work of the American Legion in vigorous, extravagant phrases that pleased his audience. Attorney Claude Williams spoke in behalf of the American Red Cross and urged cooperation in the annual roll call. Prof. John Harding led the singing of America by the audience, and at the 11 o'clock hour the audience stood in silent prayer, facing west, for one minute.

The stores were closed by proclamation of the mayor, and very few people were in town, with the exception of those who attended the program.

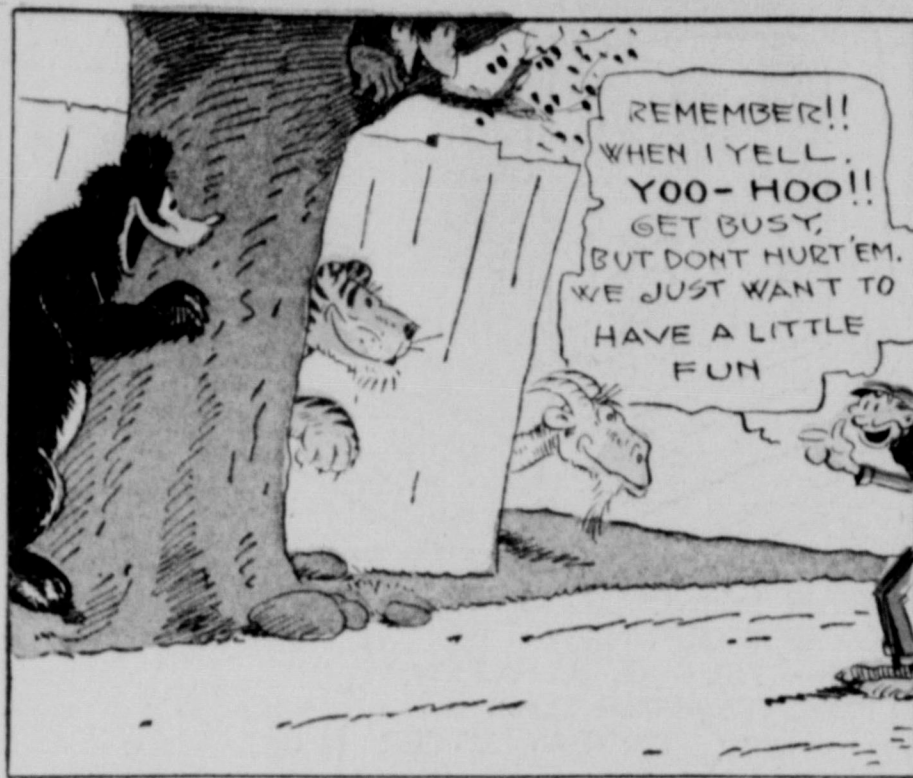

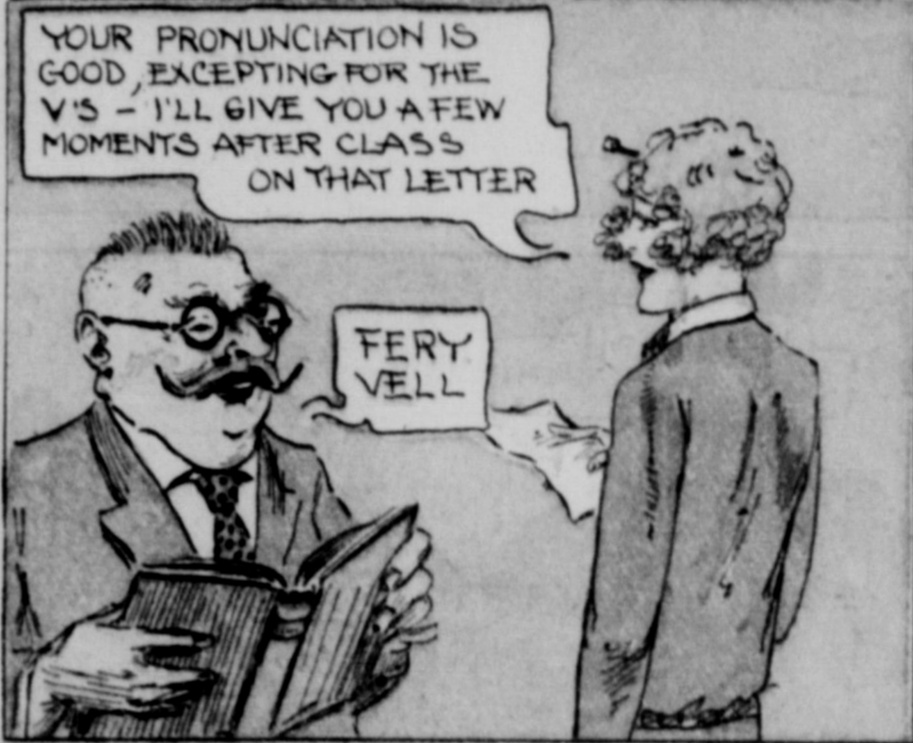

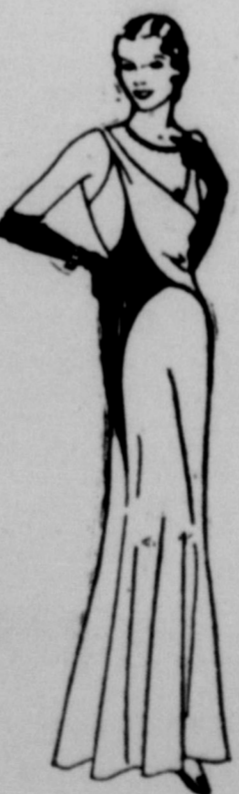
