

It would be hard to tell what might have been the fate of the country during the depression, had it not been for the faithful "carry- ing on" of the home town news- papers.	1930-1931. It would seem that such revenue collected from a population of less than 45 million people would have reduced the income tax of the country to virtually nothing. However, in- stead, the income tax paid was \$1,- 276,696,520, collected from 2,200,000 persons. In the U. ### IN ANSWER TO A LADY'S LETTER


