Fredericksburg, Va .-- The only home that John Paul Jones had in America. which still stands in Fredericksburg. has recently been marked by a tablet erected by the Betty Washington Lewchapter, D. A. R.

Jones was appointed a lieutenant in the continental navy while still a resident of Virginia. The famous American naval hero left here in 1775 when he received his appointment.

Mrs. John T. Goolrick was recently presented with a gold maltese cross In recognition of her patriotic services in securing the bronze tablet on the Jones house. Rochester, N. Y .- The lives of three boys were blotted out in Rochester as the result of the foolhardy act of had built. The explosion that followed killed one of the boys instantly and the others died in the hospital a the explosion was so great that window glass within a radius of 500 feet was shattered and the detonation was

The three boys were John McGuire, fourteen years old; Archie Clark, thirteen, and William Perry, eight. All of the boys were related, two sisters of the McGuire lad being the mothers of his two companions. The boys were in the habit of gathering junk and in their expeditions came upon the cartridges. It is estimated that 400 of the cartridges were thrown into the bonfire by the boys. This accounts for the terrific force of the explosion. The bodies of the Clark and McGuire boys were hurled 50 feet away, landing on the ground. The body of the Perry lad was dismembered. The torso was carried over a high tree and landed in the branches of an apple tree, while the head was found on the roof of a back kitchen 100 feet in an opposite direction. Other parts of the body were scattered in different directions. The eyes of the Clark and McGuire boys were blown out and their bodies were multilated frightfully. They died without regaining consciousness.




Second Floor Plan.

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

An Oppressive Trust.

Before the Coffee Roasters' Association, in session at Chicago on Thursday, Thomas J. Webb, of Chicago, charged that there is in existence a coffee combine which is "the most monstrous imposition in the history of human commerce."

There is very slight exaggeration about this statement. It comes very close to being literally true. There is a coffee combine in Brazil, from which country comes the bulk of the coffee used in the United States, which is backed by the government of Brazil and financed by it, which compels American consumers, as Mr. Webb said, "to pay famine prices for coffee when no famine

The worst thing about this is that the consumers of the United States have been compelled to put up the money through which this combine, to further cinch them, has been made effective. There were formerly revenue duties imposed upon all coffee entering the United States. Those taxes were denounced as an imposition upon the people; as taxing the poor man's breakfast table, and the like. The taxes were removed. Immediately thereafter Brazil imposed an export duty upon coffee up to the full amount of the former customs taxes in this country. The revenue which formerly went into the treasury of the United States was diverted to the treasury of Brazil. The poor man's breakfast coffee continued to cost him the

But this was only the commencement. The "valorization" plan was evolved in Brazil. Through this plan the government, using the revenues derived from the export duties for the purposes, takes all of the surplus crop in a season of large yields and holds it off the market, thus ng the supply down to the demands of the market and permitting the planters to receive a much higher price than they would otherwise

The United States consumes more Brazilian coffee than does the rest of the world. We are the best customers of Brazil, and Brazil buys little from us. Now Brazil is promoting, financing and maintaining a trust designed, and working effectively for the purpose, to compel American con-sumers to pay an exorbitant price for the coffee they use. What is the remedy?-Seattle Post-Intelligencer-Nov. 19, 1911.







The modern American thoroughbred, as we see him at our present day race meetings and horse shows, is the product of four centuries of breeding, training and experimenting. The ancestors of the present numerous equine family were rought to Virginia by the early English settlers and Virginia and adjacent parts of the South have always been famous as the breeding ground of thoroughbreds. However, much of the breeding of thoroughbreds which is and has been done in this favored region has been carried on for

love of the task rather than for financial returns. There is a wide difference between American thoroughbreds and those bred in other notable horse-raising sections (for instance, Ireland), but it would be difficult to find an American horsein who will not argue up and down that the Yankee steeds are as fine examples of all-around training as may be found anywhere on the globe The American thoroughbred is admittedly shorter than his English prototype, but it is claimed that this lack of stature is more than counterbalanced by scandness and superior constitution.

Horsemen in the United States and in the United Kingdom hold to different ideals in breeding that are bound to be reflected by certain dislarities in the animals produced. In America the tendency has been to develop thoroughbreds that will run comparatively short distances at maximum speed, whereas in England greater atention is bestowed upon the problem of breeding orses that will run long distances and will carry sight. It is to be expected that with the pass ing of racing as the supreme field of usefulness for the American thoroughbred there will be a tendency on the part of Yankee breeders to more proach the English standard, which is ed to produce borses ideal for private use

The breeding of thoroughbreds in America has been carried on most extensively in the States of Virginia, Kentucky, California, Montana, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, New York and New Jersey ned soil with a foundation of limestone, plentiful rater and an abundance of sweet grass. There water and an abundance of sweet grass. There are yet in existence many breeding farms of modest pretensions, but the tendency of recent years appears to be to create vast estates where wealthy men specialize in the breeding of thoroughbreds by aid of every facility that money and thought an provide. In Kentucky a few years ago eight fashioned stock farms were merged by a possire into one vast breeding estate of fully

s stock farm and this sum merely

covers cost of feed and labor and takes no account of the investment repre-

sented by the stock farm-usually a heavy one. There are breeders who declare that unless they can sell each of their yearlings for a price close to \$500 they do not make a reasonable profit, but in the South, where labor much of the land was fairly low, it is possible for breeders to make money from sales at lower figures than that mentioned.

The organization and management of an up-to-date breeding farm is interesting from the manner in which it insures attention to detail. The owner of the farm is usually his own manager, but in some instances there is also a resident manager to handle matters when the owner is absentas he must be much of the time if he atetnds the fairs, horse shows and

horse sales. Under the manager are a number of skilled trainers, each of whom is responsible for the education of a certain number of horses. and has the assistance of several helpers in his work. In addition to this staff there is a boss or foreman for each barn and under each barn boss is enrolled a number of grooms, exercise boys, etc. At some of the costly farms in Virginia and Kentucky we find every modern facility from a private electric light and power plant to feed cutters that not only take the grain from the private elevator and crush it, but mix the feed in any desired proportions.
