# World Wheat Supply Is

Cut 330,000,000 Bushels This year's world wheat supply will be about 330,000,000 bushels less than in 1934-35, according to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics report on world wheat prospects.

Production is estimated at about 0,430,000,000 bushels and the world carryover outside of Russia at 800,-000,000 bushels, or a total of about 4,230,000,000 bushels. Production last year was 3,459,000,000 bushels and carryover 1,100,000,000 bushels or a total of about 4,559,000,000 bushels. The short crops this year will reduce world carryover by the end of this season to between 400,-000,000 and 500,000,000 bushels, or not much more than normal world carryover prior to 1928.


