MURMURING AGAINST GOD IS UNJUSTIFIED

Many people are stricken with an ailment or are thrown out of work or experience some mishap for which they directly blame God and murmur against Him. They argue: If God is a just God and a loving God, why does He permit such misfortunes to befall us? They do not look into the mirror of the Law of God and see for themselves that they are sinful and unworthy of all the benefits and blessings which they had received to date.

God tempts no one to evil. He often puts a person to a test or a severe trial with the intention of testing his faith, not to destroy it. All things work together for good. Sometimes a supposed evil is a blessing in disguise. Many people who did not have money would have invested it if they had had it and finally would have lost it. Many poor people are more blessed than rich people. They have less worries and anxieties, even if they do not know where the next meal is coming from. They do not have to worry about being black-mailed, kidnapped, or poisoned for their money. Many rich people are groping in physical weakness while many poor people are enjoying perfect health. Whatever God ordains is good. Blessed be His holy name. It does not pay to murmur against the Holy and all-wise God who knows what is best for each one of us. He wants us to pray for our daily necessities and wants and also expects us to thank Him for the blessings.

We are not to tempt Christ, murmur against Him as did the children of Israel in the wilderness. The Israelites in question complained of not having bread and water, in spite of the fact that they received manna, a special food each day except on the Sabbath. On Fridays they had to gather a double amount to tide them over on the seventh day, during which they were not permitted to work. Because of their dissatisfaction and murmurings God punished them by sending fiery serpents among them. The venom was deadly; the Israelites were dying. They then realized that God was punishing them for their ingratitude and unbelief. They begged their leader, Moses, to pray to God to avert that deadly catastrophe. Moses complied with their wish. God then ordered Moses to construct a serpent of brass and mount him on a pole. Whoever would look upon the serpent of brass would be saved from death.

And so today. All those that cease to murmur, and look to God for help will receive help. We cannot dictate to God when and how He is to help us. He will aid us at the time He decides is best. We must rely solely on Him and say, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." Let us get on our knees and seek God and talk with Him in our prayers. He wants us to depend on Him as a child depends upon his father. He is entitled to such respect and gratitude for He is our father and Creator.

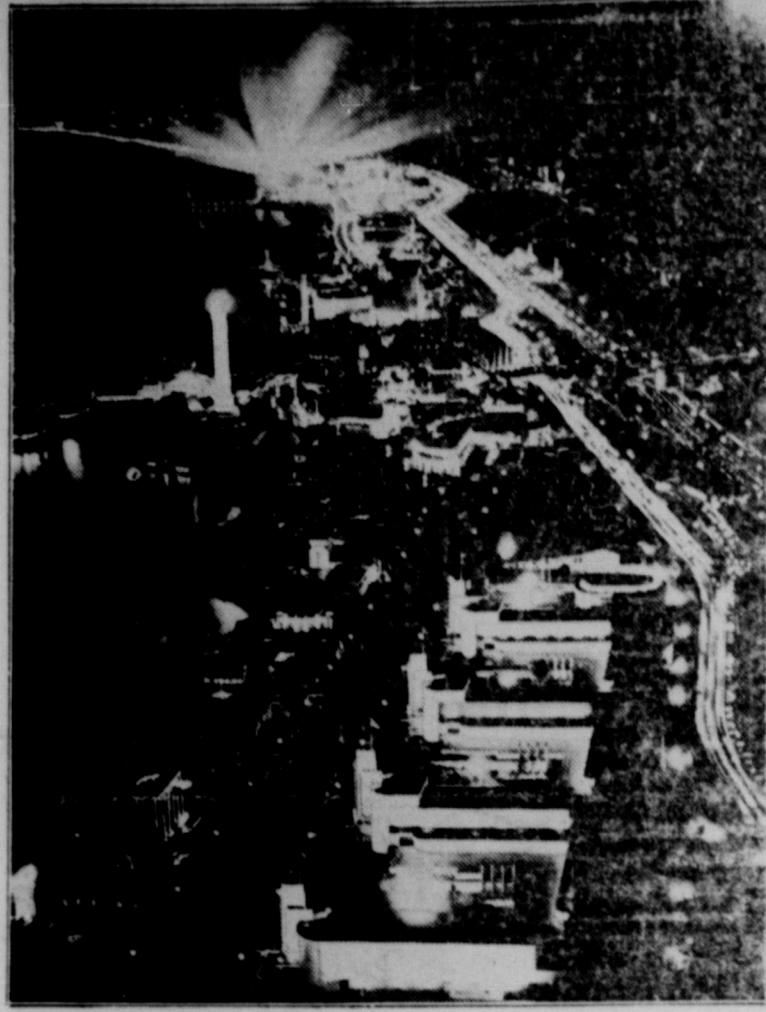

AN EDITOR'S ENEMIES

Good honest men seldom ever get angry with an editor. They generally know that most editors care very little about money except just enough to keep a decent home.  They trample on people's toes sometimes, not just to hear them squeal—but because they have an honest conviction that those people are wrong. They seldom let personal feelings prompt an attack. The longer they stay with it, the more the editor's personal feelings are submerged and the public spirit arises.
 The true journalist doesn't care much if he ruins a good customer if he feels that he has done something for the public. The common man is always his friend. Editors hate upity people who try to make a big show of themselves and snub ordinary people. They see life as it is, and as

they would have it.
 They get cussed more than a dozen other people and seldom give a damn for persecution and criticism they have every turn but they get accustomed to it.
 As a rule they love good neighbors even if they are mill hands, hater sham and hypocrisy, have the fundamental principle of religion, defend honest men, despise indolence and pity ignorance.
 There's always some half-witted politician sore at them, but by the grace of the Good Lord, it seldom hurts them. Good men understand and believe in them. Only the by-fours ever get sore with them.—C. Spurgeon Dr'n in the Missouri Press News.
