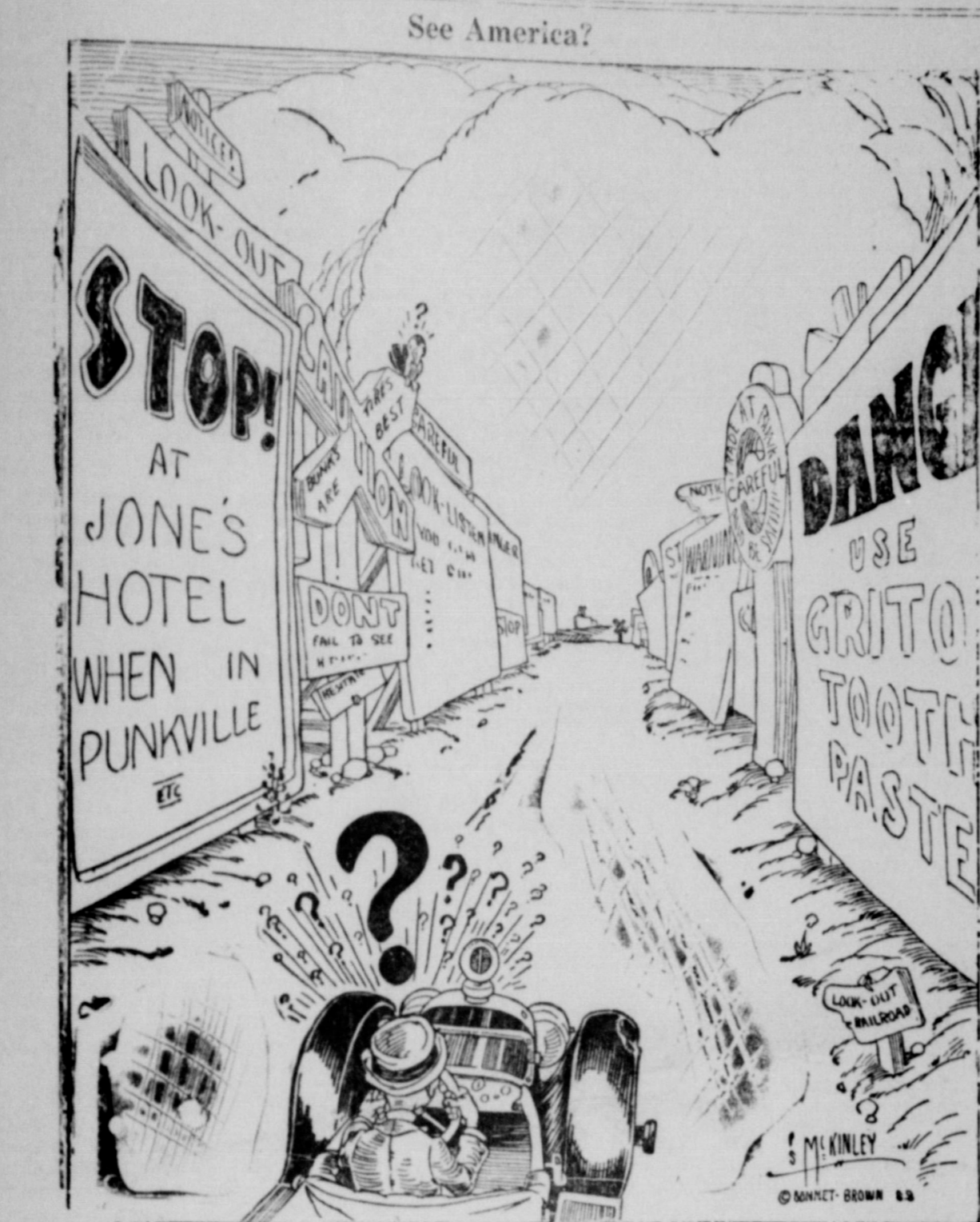

VALUE OF POLLEN EXTRACTS

Number of factors are responsible for the beneficial results following the use of these extracts at the present time. First, the improved methods of preparation now employed assures potency, maximum stability, and uniform dosage. Second, the making of diagnostic skin tests determines absolute exactness — to which the pollen the subject is sensitized assuring the use of the correct dose for each individual.

Causes Now Recognized An important part which various factors play in the etiology of hay fever is now recognized, and means their elimination constitute an important part of the treatment. Attention to the removal of these causes ranks second in importance only to the administration of pollen extract. In fact, the results obtained from the use of the extract are governed to a large degree by the thoroughness with which the various factors are deleted from the individual picture.

Detoxifying Treatment A program having as its object the removal of all toxins from the system should be undertaken early in all cases. Every avenue of elimination should be opened. The skin must be kept in an active state by daily bathing morning and evening. The liver and kidneys should be kept "flushed out" by an intake of large quantities of water and

the intestinal tract must be kept active by transforming the flora and by efficient daily evacuation. The nose, throat and sinuses—the respiratory channel as a whole—must be kept in as healthy a condition as possible. The load on every organ of the organism must be lightened by proper diet, plenty of sleep, avoidance of all mental and physical stresses.

to Start the Treatment The time to start the campaign is one day before election. Statistics show that in the vast majority of cases the best results are obtainable by desensitization. That the injection of the pollen extract should be started from four weeks before the date of the attack. Hence, one whose attack usually comes on around the first of August should begin the desensitization program about the first

of August. The desensitization program should be continued from each injection until the extract lasts about a week and then begins to diminish. For the series of doses is so spaced that the maximum dose will be reached at the beginning of the season. This maximum dose which the patient has been adapted to the graded doses given, is then repeated every seven days during the season. The immunity thus conferred is not known so far as its duration is concerned. However, it has been definitely determined that it does not extend into the next season, and less endure for three or four years as some over-optimistic people think. However, if one can keep free from symptoms by desensitization during the severe seasons, it is likely to develop the disease again.

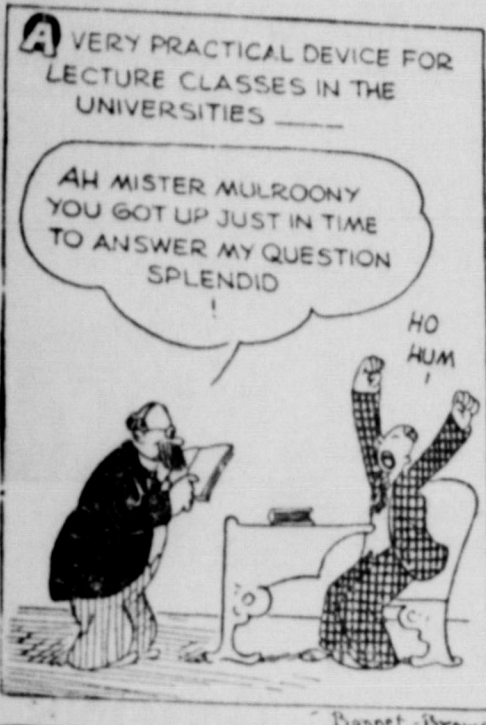

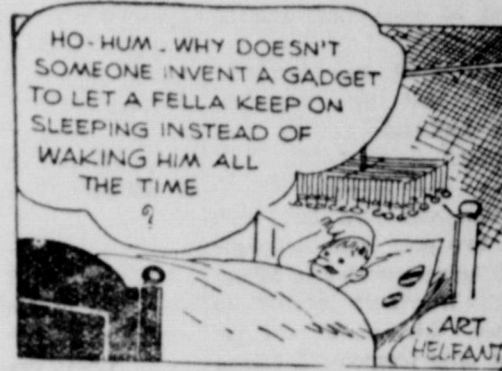

Household Hints

Fudge is a popular confection the year round and lucky is the person whose product is smooth and creamy. The greatest trouble most cooks have with fudge is in its sugary or grainy feeling. They try cooking the mixture fast and they cook it slow and sometimes vary the amounts of the ingredients.

However, the only thing that will make the results uniformly good is to add one tablespoon of white corn syrup for each cup of sugar used. This is so because the sugar changes in cooking but if the quality of the sugar is not just right it is almost impossible to cook it so that the proper change will take place. The syrup is the sugar as it ought to be after cooking and by having a small amount present all chance is gone away with.

The Best Method

An infallible recipe for delicious fudge is this:
Mix 2 cups of sugar, 4 rounding tablespoons of cocoa, 2 tablespoons of syrup and 1/2 cup of rich milk. Cook slowly, without stirring, to the soft ball stage (230 degrees). Remove from fire and add 1 tablespoon of butter.
Place pan in cold water and beat until it can be lifted with a spoon. Add 1 teaspoon of vanilla and chopped nuts if desired. Pour over marshmallows on greased platter.

2. Three-fourths milk and one-fourth water may be used in fudge?
3. Whole cream is a little too rich to use in fudge?
4. The amount of cocoa used in fudge should be varied according to the strength of the kind used?
5. Salted nuts may be used in fudge instead of unsalted with delicious results?
6. Hot camphorated oil applied with a flannel cloth will bring back the color to white spots on furniture?
7. A gold necklace can be cleaned by scrubbing with hot sea-suds and a brush and polished with a soft flannel when dry?
8. Lemon juice will often remove stains from brass?
9. Slow cooking can be done over the simmering burner in a stove with less gas than is used by a larger burner turned low?
10. The burners of a gas stove may be cleaned safely and well by boiling them in a strong solution of washing soda?

PINEAPPLE MACAROON

Mix one cup of crushed pineapple with one cup of sugar, two cups of water, the juice of one-half a lemon and the white of one egg beaten stiff. Freeze.
When ready to serve, shape the ice for each serving with a tablespoon and roll in macaroon crumbs or

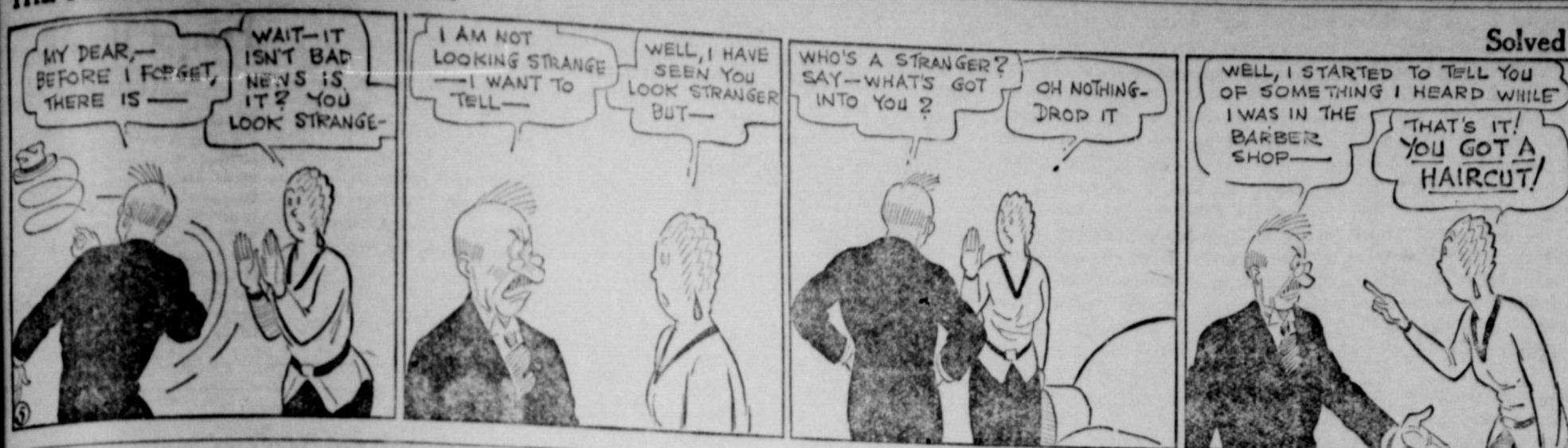

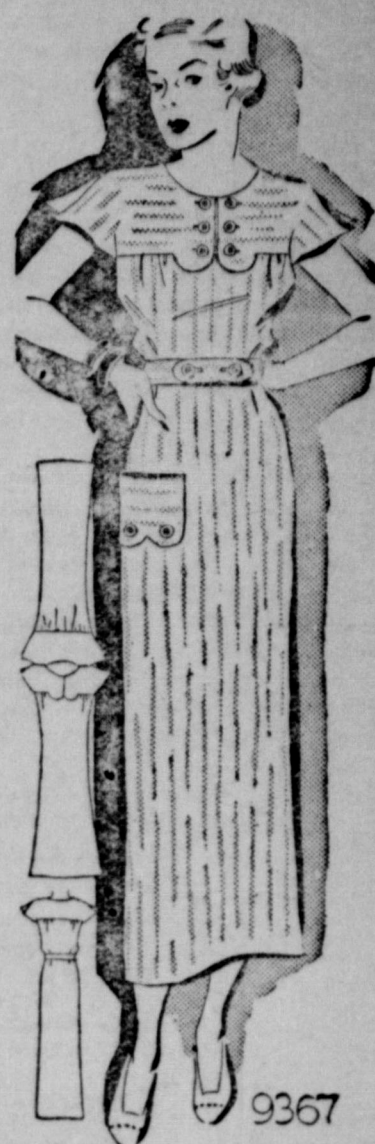

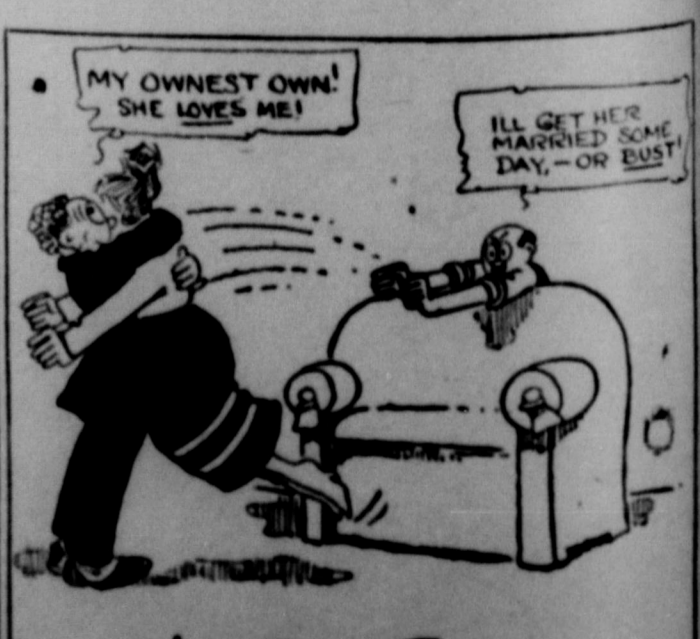
