## State Capital News

Water development leaders are talking about another \$3.5 billion water authorization in the wake of the week's constitutional amendment elections.

Water bonds — to finance the state's share of the \$9 billion water plan — were defeated by only a few thousand votes of some 700,000 cast.

Meanwhile, says water experts, a master plan is not dead. Preliminary negotiations for out-of-state water can continue, and voter approval can be scheduled on bonds in 1971. Hopefully by then some of the major objections will be resolved.

In the amendments program, solved one of the state's long problems, for the time being at any rate. They voted two-to-one in favor of raising the welfare ceiling \$20 million a year, to \$80 million. This aid goes to families with dependent children (AFDC) payments back to par, and stave off more cuts in the near future. Voters also favored \$200 million in college student loan funds to continue the Texas Opportunity Plan of aid to needy students bent on higher education.

Elimination of deadwood from state constitution met strong support. So did payments to survivors of volunteer firemen, revenue or auxiliary police and other state or local government employees killed in line of hazardous duty.

On the other hand, voters were agonistic toward four other proposed amendments on the 5 ballot.

They overwhelmingly rejected raises for state legislators at annual sessions of the legislature. They disapproved property tax exemptions for non-profit supply corporations by a 2-1 strong margin and narrowly rejected lifting the constitutional interest rate ceilings state bonds.

Defeat of the annual sessions amendment put an end to hopes many legislators that another 10-year, no-tax state budget be passed in the current session and accepted by Gov. Preston Smith.

### Tax Bill to Senate

Now it's the Senate's week to vote on the tax bill. Those who passed the \$341 million proposal of revenue raising to balance a biennial budget and sent across the rotunda. From committee it is an overstatement to say senators don't like it, but brings are underway in an attempt to come up with an acceptable compromise—and that isn't easy.

Here is what the House bill calls levies effective Jan. 1: Raises the sales tax rate from three to 3.5 percent. Boost the cigarette tax five to a pack, to 16 cents. Launches a new 3.5 percent tax on telephone and telegraph repairs, appliance (except washing machines, dryers and refrigerators) and jewelry repairs, parking, laundry and dry-cleaning (except self-service) and professional services. Included in the latter would be admission charges to professional athletic events, night clubs, dance halls, amusement parks and scenic attractions.

Levies a 10 cent transaction tax on each sale or purchase of stocks, bonds, warrants and other securities, with few exceptions. Cut the gross receipts tax on telephone and telegraph companies from 2.5 percent to 1.9 percent.

City officials are angry because, while new sales and service taxes would be levied at present in those municipalities, each levy local option sales tax, they would get none of added revenue.

One thing seems certain: what comes out of the Senate is unlikely to bear much resemblance to what came over from the House.

First \$14 million in new college loan fund bonds were sold last week.

First National City Bank of New York and Associates was successful bidder at a net effective interest rate of 5.4162 percent. Announcement came from Tom Sealy of Midland, chairman of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System Board administration.

## LOOKIN' BACK

The history of the early cars and owners make an interesting story. The first car ever in McLean was one driven into town by F. A. Dubbs of Clarendon and J. P. Hodges of the Naylor community. They came over to visit Will J. Hodges. The first car ever owned by a resident of McLean was the property of a Mr. Devaught who lived on North Main where Mrs. Alderson lives now. The first closed car (sedan) was owned by A. J. Christian.

In May of 1913, the editor of the McLean News spent Friday "touring" from McLean to Albreed on the Rock Island. From Albreed he caught the mail back to Lefors. Here he spent the night at the Thut Hotel and Saturday morning went to Pampa with Sheriff Denson. This was the first time he (the editor) had been in Pampa in three years.

In that city he saw Mel Davis in his grocery store and visited with Charley Cook, McLean boy turned lawyer and county attorney. Saturday night he stayed at the Thut Hotel again and Sunday morning Joe Loffin came to the Denson home where the editor met him. Joe was in this Buick 31 and Frank Faulkner joined the three gentlemen for a flying trip to Pampa. It took only 30 minutes to go from Lefors to Pampa. When they got back to Lefors, they picked up Charlie Upham and Yancey Bates and made another trek to Pampa.

Here they bought gas and made a flying trip to Miami where they viewed the construction of their new \$40,000 court house. When they finally got back to Lefors at 10:00 that night Upham and Bates realized they had gone away without letting their wives know.

In June, 1913, C. C. Cooper, J. T. Foster, J. L. Crabtree and Charles Hedrick in a Hupmobile were on their way to Lefors. Following them were Homer Crabtree and Mrs. Hedrick. Homer was learning to drive so Mrs. Hedrick let him have the wheel. He lost control of the car going down an incline, ran into a ditch four feet deep on the right side of a culvert, and the car turned completely over with Crabtree underneath. Mrs. Hedrick had jumped from the vehicle, bruised and maimed, but she managed to raise the car and let Crabtree get out.

June, 1913, a city ordinance was passed making it unlawful to drive a car at a greater speed than eight miles an hour within the radius of 220 yards of the public well.

Speaking of the public well, you should see the beautiful oil painting of an early day street scene showing that well. The picture was painted by Effie Lou Everett as a gift to the Museum. Soon it will be framed and hung on our walls. As Chuck Cooke says, "It brings back a lot of memories." Come in and look at it. What we want to know is—when was that well first dug? If you can answer that question please call me or come by the museum and let us know as we need the exact date.

The museum is looking more like it should each day. Come by and see for yourself. Better still, bring something to exhibit in it. Remember—you may lend. It is not necessary to give your antiques. Just let us exhibit them for a while.

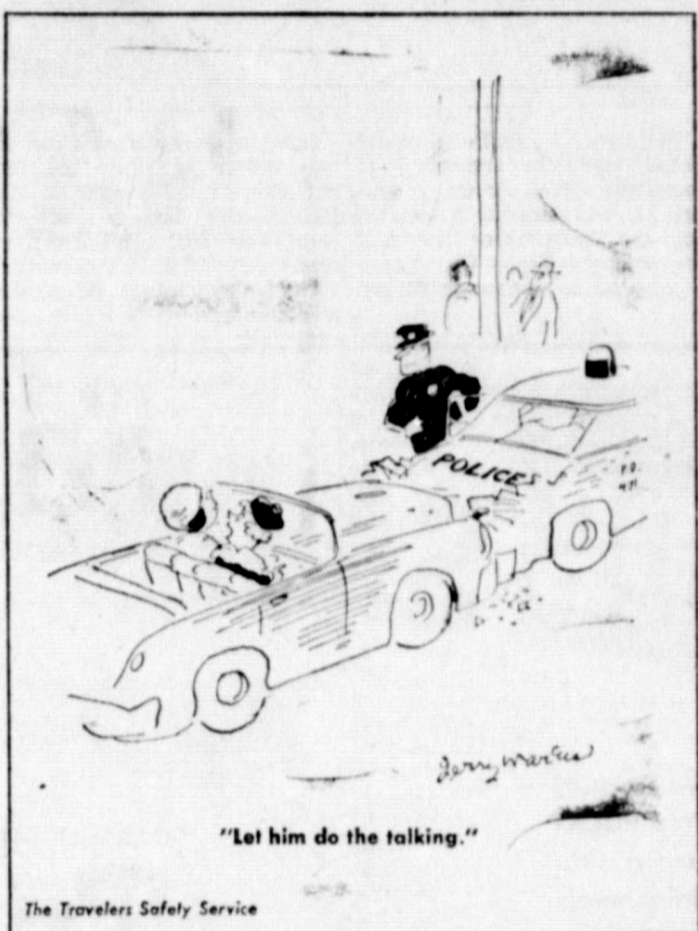

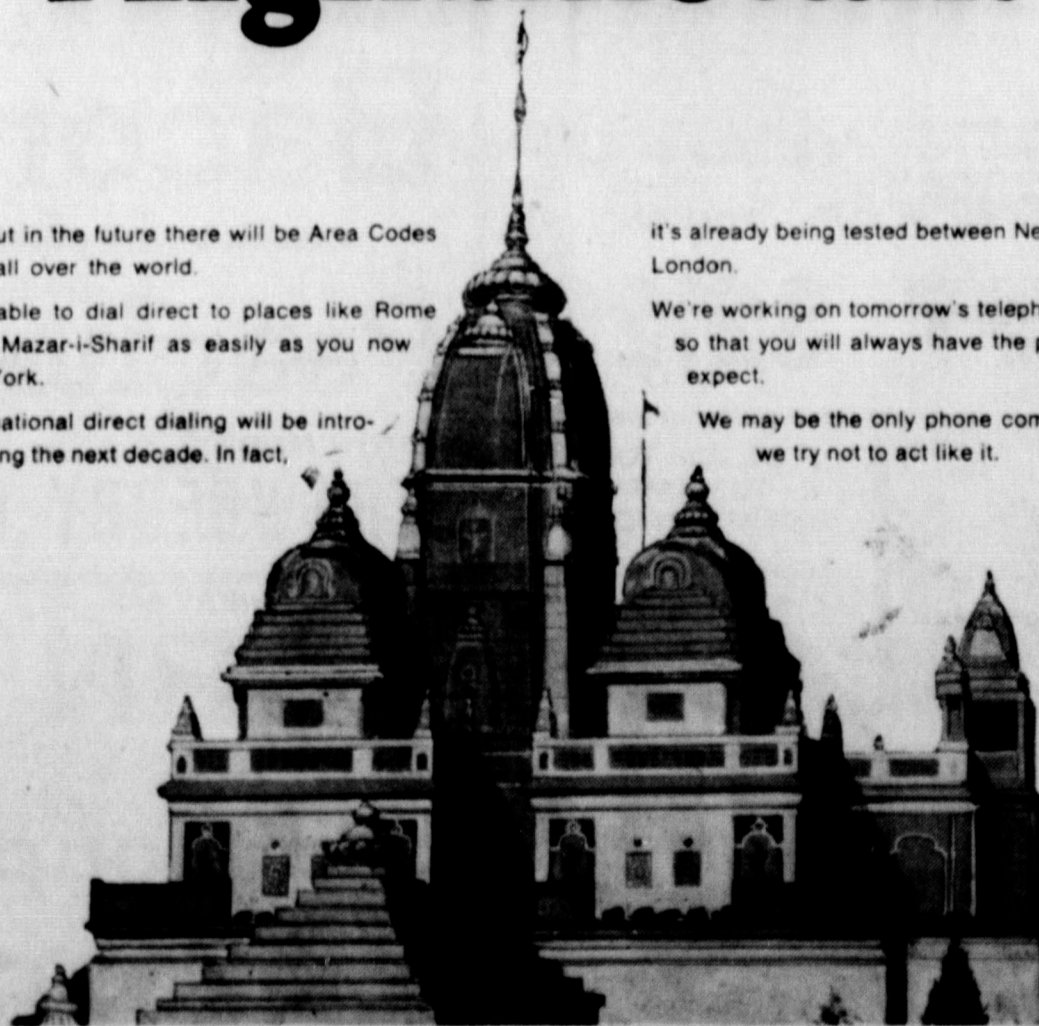

## LOOKIN' BACK

by Vera Featherston Back

The history of the early cars and owners make an interesting story. The first car ever in McLean was one driven into town by F. A. Dubbs of Clarendon and J. P. Hodges of the Naylor community. They came over to visit Will J. Hodges. The first car ever owned by a resident of McLean was the property of a Mr. Devaught who lived on North Main where Mrs. Alderson lives now. The first closed car (sedan) was owned by A. J. Christian.

In May of 1913, the editor of the McLean News spent Friday "touring" from McLean to Alanreed on the Rock Island. From Alanreed he caught the mail back to Lefors. Here he spent the night at the Thut Hotel and Saturday morning went to Pampa with Sheriff Denson. This was the first time he (the editor) had been in Pampa in three years.

In that city he saw Mel Davis in his grocery store and visited with Charley Cook, McLean boy turned lawyer and county attorney. Saturday night he stayed at the Thut Hotel again and Sunday morning Joe Loftin came to the Denson home where the editor met him. Joe was in this Buick 31 and Frank Faulkner joined the three gentlemen for a flying trip to Pampa. It took only 30 minutes to go from Lefors to Pampa. When they got back to Lefors, they picked up Charlie Upham and Yancey Bates and made another trek to Pampa.

Here they bought gas and made a flying trip to Miami where they viewed the construction of their new \$40,000 court house. When they finally got back to Lefors at 10:00 that night Upham and Bates realized they had gone away without letting their wives know.

In June, 1913, C. C. Cooper, J. T. Foster, J. L. Crabtree and Charles Hedrick in a Hummobile were on their way to Lefors. Following them were Homer Crabtree and Mrs. Hedrick. Homer was learning to drive so Mrs. Hedrick let him have the wheel. He lost control of the car going down an incline, ran into a ditch four feet deep on the right side of a culvert, and the car turned completely over with Crabtree underneath. Mrs. Hedrick had jumped from the vehicle, bruised and maimed, but she managed to raise the car and let Crabtree get out.

June, 1913, a city ordinance was passed making it unlawful to drive a car at a greater speed than eight miles an hour within the radius of 200 yards of the public well.

Speaking of the public well, you should see the beautiful oil painting of an early day street scene showing that well. The picture was painted by Effie Lou Everett as a gift to the Museum. Soon it will be framed and hung on our walls. As Chuck Cooke says, "It brings back a lot of memories." Come in and look at it. What we want to know is—when was that well first dug? If you can answer that question please call me or come by the museum and let us know as we need the exact date.

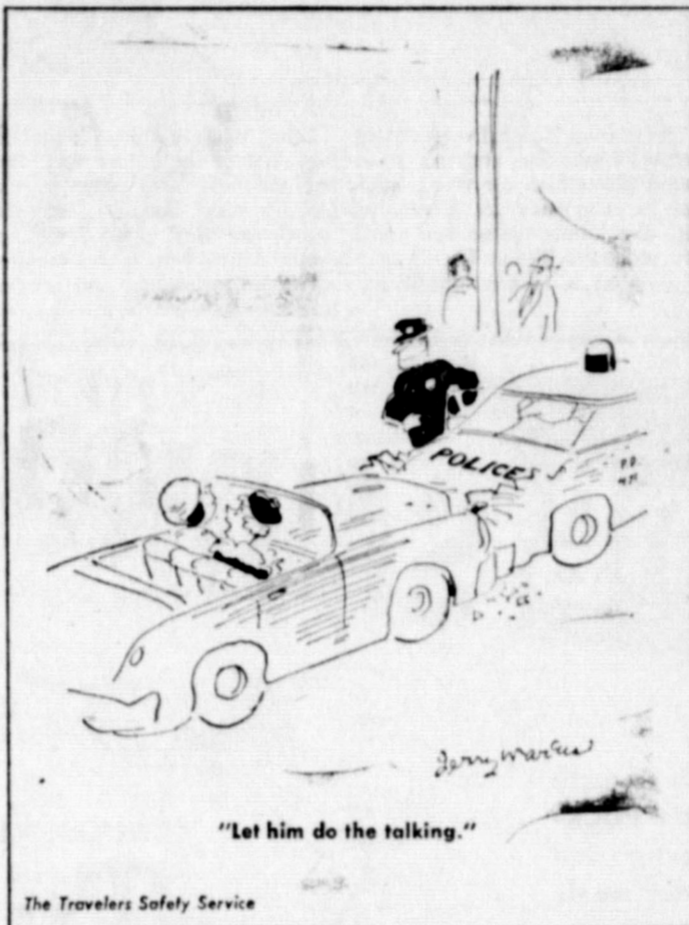

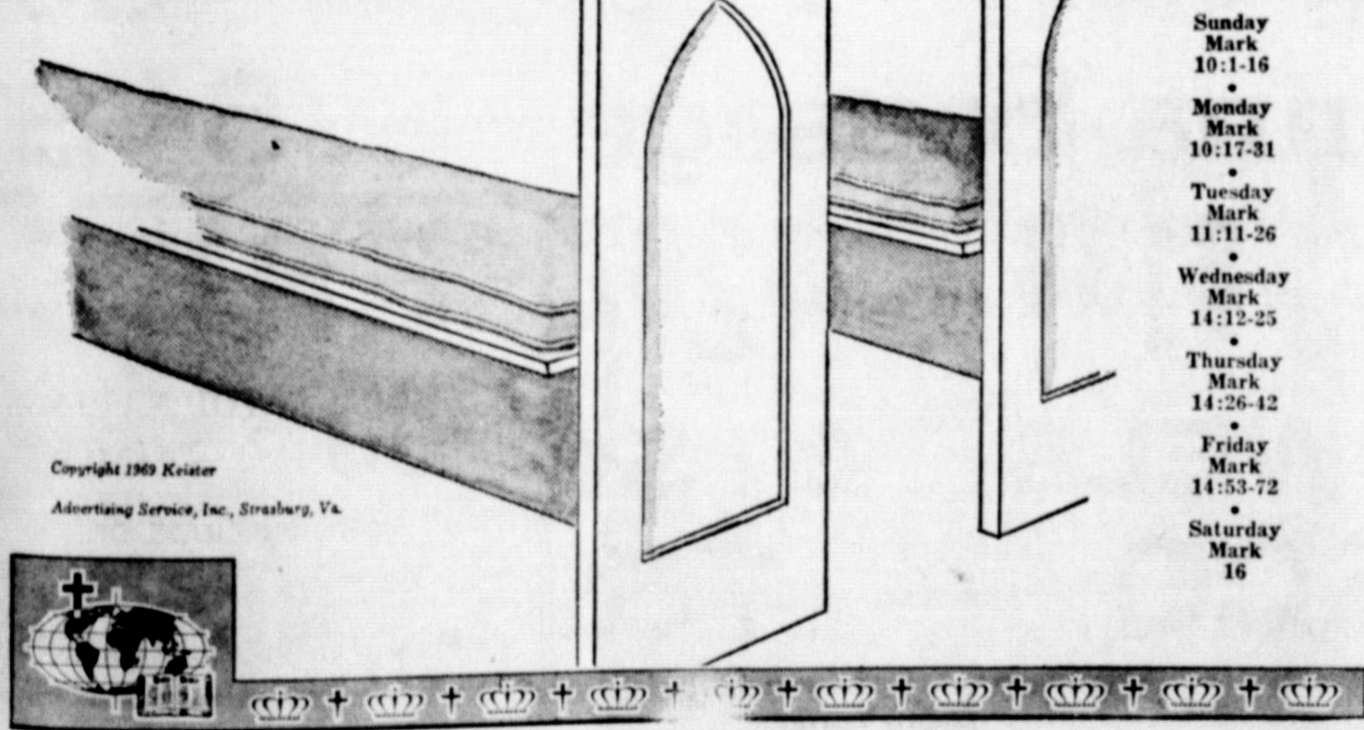

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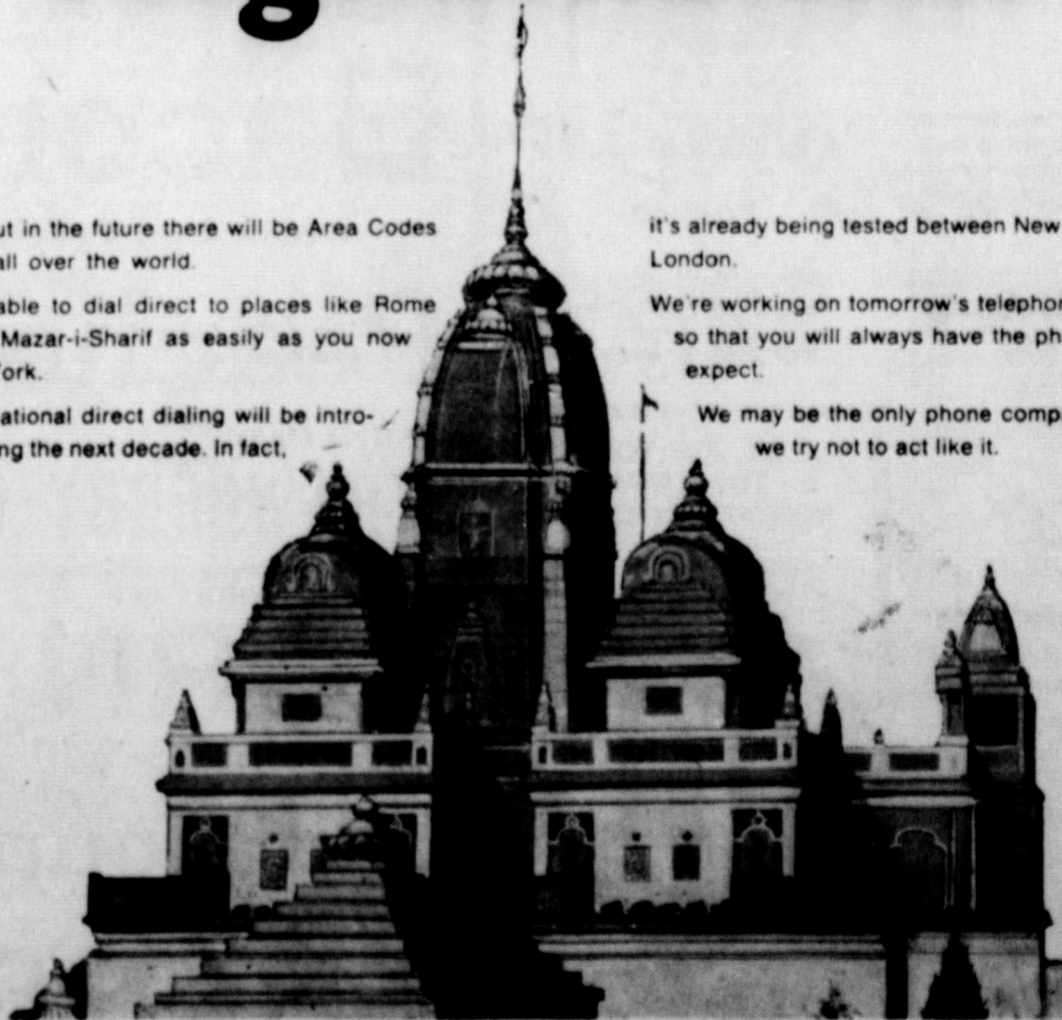
