Gray County oil and gas wells pumped some \$37.5 million into the county's economy last year, according to a study just released by the Texas Cid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

Value of production from oil wells was \$27.6 million and from natural-gas wells \$9.9 million 1/2 based on the most recent U.S. Bureau of Mines figures compiled by the Association. The county ranked 31 in the state in value of production

Last year, the county produced 9.4 million barrels of crude oil and 76.6 billion cubic feet of natural gas.

in the United States. They'll eat almost anything, and stay up all night to do so.

Studies show the kinds of food eaten by catfish number into the thousands and include mammals, birds, amphibians, nsects, reptiles, fruit, seeds, eaves and oddities too num erous to mention.

Yet, with such a versatile ap petite, catfish are selective about what they'll eat - and when they'll feed. Successful catfish anglers, say the fishing authorities at Mercury out boards, are just as selective in their choice of catfish baits.

"Stink" baits are the most common catfish lure. They're particularly effective in spring and fall. Cheese is usually the base ingredient. Additives such as flour or corn meal provide substance and such things as oil of anise, tankage, or asafetida join the mess to provide the correct odor. Stink bait is generally fished on the bottom.

Chicken blood is probably the best catfish bait of all. The main problem is to keep it on the hook. Blood bait is made by letting fresh blood coagulate under refrigeration, and cutting coagulum into strips. To fish blood bait, anchor your boat, place the bait in the wat. er as easy as possible and don't move it after it has reached bottom.

Live baits - minnows, cray fish, frogs - are also effective catfish getters. They can be floated or still fished - although floating will usually produce the most catches. The secret, say the Mercury experts, is to have a lively bait.

Whatever the choice of bait, you're in for some gourmet dining when you've caught a mess of catfish. Cut into oneinch-thick steaks, dipped in milk and rolled in corn meal, then deep-fried . . there's nothing on the table that can beat them for eating.





Buying meat for meals this summer will require careful planning and shopping if you are looking for the most economical

Remember that the cost per serving is the important considerable amount of bone and fat, while others are practically all edible meat.

In a recent summary of the meat situation, the U.S. Department of Agriculture predicts that livestock prices this summer will continue above last year's prices, even though red meat and poultry supplies will be larger. Rising consumer incomes, unusually low unemployment rates, and the increase in population were sighted as the main reasons for this outlook.

Meat and poultry that require short cooking time are in greatest demand during warm weather. Here are a few sugges

Pork: Chops-rib or loin, or shoulder steaks, cut % to 1 inch thick; sausage patties or links; Canadian bacon; ham slices-½ to 1 inch thick; or spare ribs. Beef: Chuck steaks, cuts near the rib are good if properly tenderized. Of course, the more tender T-bone, porterhouse, sirloin, club, rib, rib eye or Delmonico, or filet mignon and ground beef patties work well, too.
