**Cows to Be Tested Friday** 

Dr. Nichols, state veterinarian, will be in McLean Friday of this week to test cows for Bangs disease and vaccinate dogs for rabies. Anyone who sells milk in Mc-Lean must have cows tested annually to conform to the city milk ordinance.

No test for TB is contemplated, as this area has been declared TB free; however, Dr. Nichols can make this test if wanted. Tests for Bangs disease and the vaccination of dogs are made for a very small fee, and those wantiny this work done should leave word at the city hall.




