

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



Colored lense. hould not be used on fog lights n general, because they cut down he total amount of visibility. A clear fog lamp, mounted as ar to the right and as low on he car as possible, will produce he least glare.

The favorite ambition of Author Sherwood Anderson was to own a country newspaper.


"But how can the owner of a small-town paper ever have a good staff when he has limited funds?" sked a friend.




