### DWIGHT AWARDED DEC

15th AAP in Italy.-Hanging from the catwalk of a B-17's bomb four miles above the earth. T Sgt. Clyde Dwight, Jr. of Mcean, over Prague, Czechoslovakia, which had hung up in the rack, menacing his ship with destruction, in an action which has rought him the Distinguish d Flying Cross for "extraordinary scinevement in aerial flight." The bomb load that day, destined

for enemy installations in Prague, consisted of fragmentation bombs in clusters of six. As the bombs were released over the target ome of the clusters broke apart. soaving three bombs still in the bay, entangled in arming wire.

Hanging from the lower part of the outer rack, they were subjected to the high winds rushing in through the open bomb bay doors. The nose and tail vanes of the bombs began to turn. 




