C. of C. Meeting Several Speakers

The monthly meeting of the McLean chapter of commerce was held at the city park Monday evening. President Emory Crockett calling the meeting to order. Bill Stubbs was introduced as president of the Top o' Texas Dairy Association, and the meeting turned to him.

The first speaker of the evening was Miss Millicent Schaub, county home demonstration agent. She stressed the need for sanitary dairying in Gray county, and said that Texas lacks 51% of producing enough milk for its population.

The second speaker was County Agent J. P. Smith, who has devoted a lot of time toward advancing dairying in Gray county and adjoining communities. Mr. Smith said, "the term 'post war' has been worn out—it's time we thought of the present." He said the county should be commended for making this start toward better dairying. He also stated that he had the authority to announce that when the soil conservation office is established, it will be at McLean.

Boyd Reeves, agriculture chairman of the C. of C., expressed pleasure in the response to his efforts in making the meeting possible, and stated that he thought at this time a milk route with a cooling plant would be appropriate. A motion was made to establish a milk route and cooling plant. Homer Abbott, Leroy Williams and Ollie Hommel were appointed as a committee to work out details.

Ice cream and cake were served to some 90 people by Mesdames Frank Reeves, Bill Stubbs, Homer Abbott, Leroy Williams and R. F. Sanders.

In the cake contest, first prize went to Mrs. Leroy Williams; second, Mrs. Bill Stubbs; third, Mrs. Homer Abbott.

Some 40 employees with two full-time doctors, are on the force.

That all this could be accomplished during war time, is proof that any town, including McLean, could do the same, if an equal effort was made. McLean needs a hospital; why not a committee from the chamber of commerce to investigate possibilities?

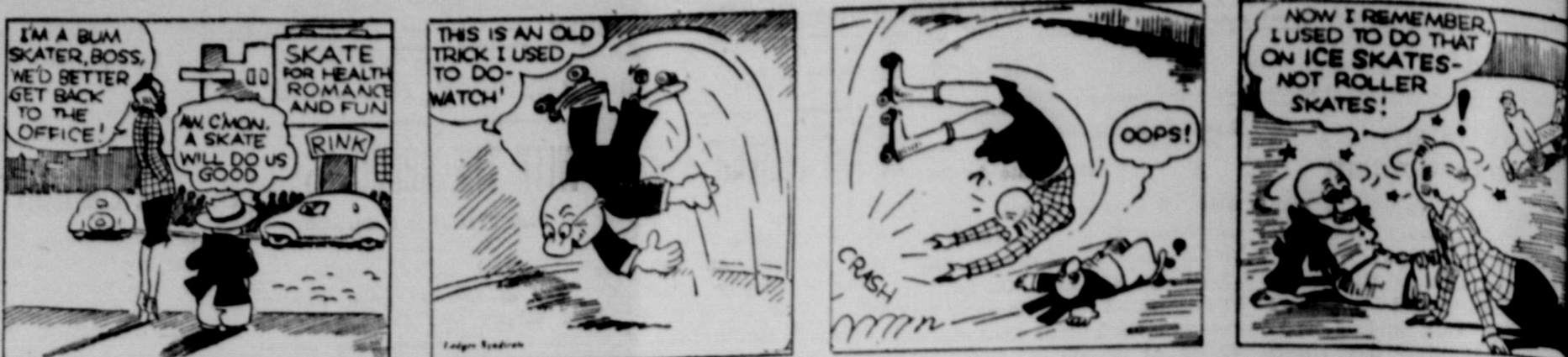

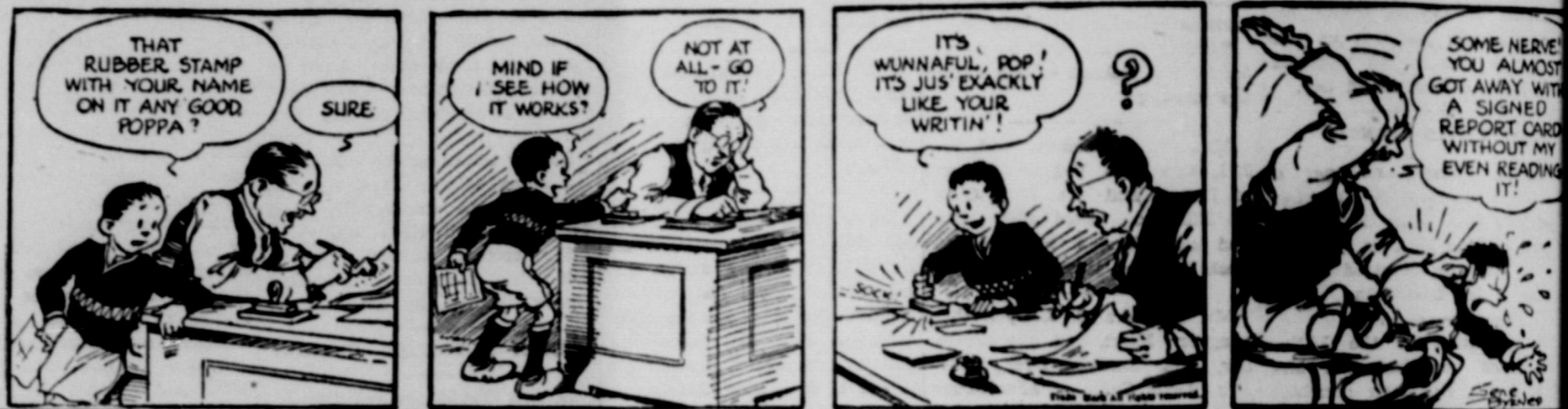

DRINK ONLY SAFE MILK

Austin.—As a safeguard against the serious and disabling disease known as undulant fever or Malta fever, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State health officer, advises Texans to drink milk only from approved sources. Undulant fever is usually acquired by human beings as a result of consuming raw milk or raw milk products from cows infected with Bang's disease.

Raw milk or milk products can be consumed with safety only when they are known to be produced by cows tested and found to be free of Bang's disease. Pasteurization, of course, will kill the germs if present.

To lower the incidence of undulant fever, all dairymen are asked to cooperate with the State Department of Health by removing cattle infected with Bang's disease from their herds as soon as the disease is discovered. Even if the milk is made safe for human consumption by pasteurization, infected cows are still a menace to health since they can transmit the disease to healthy animals and to their owner and other persons who handle them.

"Undulant fever," Dr. Cox said, "is one health menace we can eradicate in our State through absolutely safe milk supplies from dairy herds free from Bang's disease."

"Unless a herd is known to be free from this infection, only pasteurized milk should be used so that the disease cannot be passed on to the consumer of milk and dairy products."

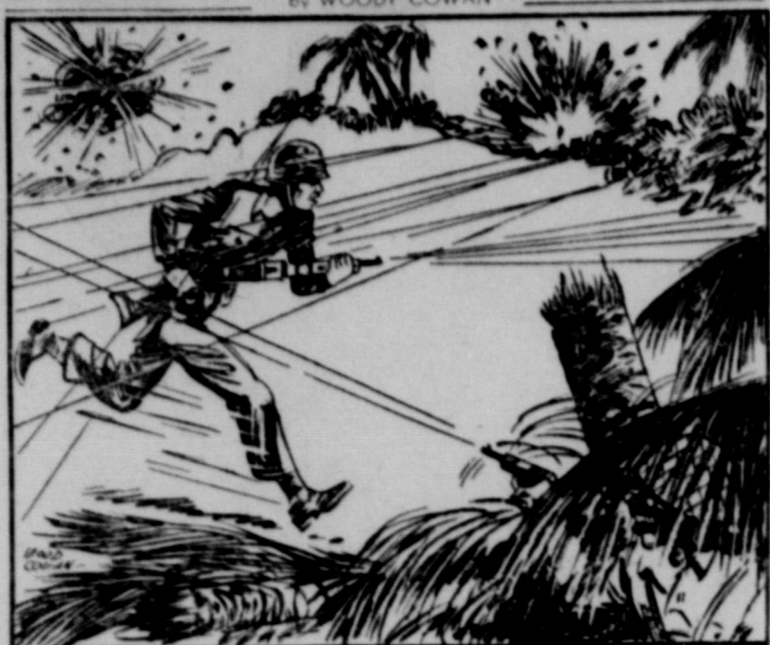
