4-H Forum To Be Held In Amarillo November 10-12

Four-H adult leaders in district if the Texas Agriculture Extension Service will conduct a forum in Amarillo November 10-12 aimed at bettering 4-H and expanding opportunities for 4-H activities.

Five adult leaders from each of the 22 counties in the district will attend the three-day session, announces County Extension Agent Foster Whaley. This number will include the two county delegates who are members of the district 4-H adult Leaders Association. Executive officers of the association may attend in addition to the five leaders.

An outstanding slate of speakers will be on hand at the forum, points out Whaley. They include Dr. L. S. Pope, associate dean of agriculture, Texas A&M University; Mrs. Jayne Jayroe Peterson, Miss America for 1967; and Reagan Brown, Extension sociologist, Texas A&M.

Also, Bill Sarpallus, Boys Ranch, Clarendon College; Bob Wear, minister Crescent Park Church of Christ, Littlefield; Mrs. Milton McGehee, past president, Texas Home Demonstration Agents Association; and Dr. Edward Schlutt, associate state 4-H leader, Texas A&M.

Several adult leaders and county extension agents will also speak during the conference. In addition, four outstanding 4-H'ers from the district will present their views on the benefits of 4-H Club work, says Whaley. They are Ronnie Enns, Dallam County; Rebecca Hutchinson, Hansford County; Jimmy Eggleston, Lipscomb County; and Joyce Bezner, Deaf Smith County.

Also featured during the forum will be group assemblies and group discussions and reports as well as skits and recreation.

The three-day party will be held at the Episcopal Church Conference Center in Amarillo with registration beginning at 9:45 a.m. on November 10. The program will conclude at 3 p.m. on November 12.

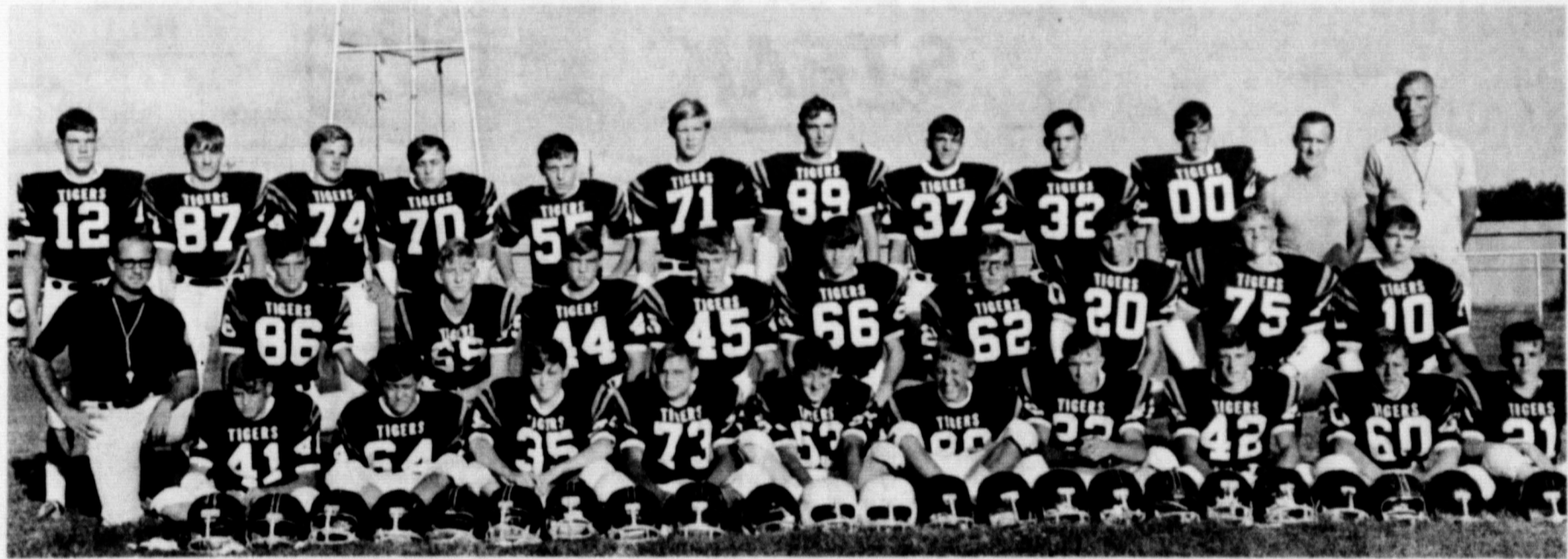

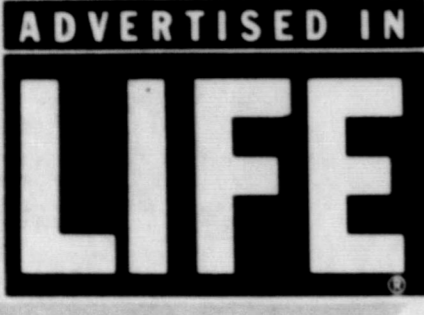

Medical Tags
People who have medical
conditions requiring special at-
tention in an emergency should
wear medical identification tags.
Made of either plastic or
metal, the tags can be worn
around the wrist, ankle, or
neck. A tag identifies the medical
condition and sometimes
gives names and phone num-
bers of the nearest kin and
family physician. Among those
who should wear emergency
medical identification tags are
diabetics, epileptics, people
with regular needs for pre-
scribed medicine, and persons
with drug allergies.

Texas Motor Vehicle
Inspection Began
Sept. 1, 1969

On September 1, 1969 the
Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection
Program began a year-around
inspection schedule, announced
Captain Alan Johnson, Service
Commander of the Texas De-
partment of Public Safety for this
area.
Briefly, Captain Johnson
listed the changes: Inspections
go on monthly, year-around
schedule; sticker location
changed to left side of wind-
shield; Number of the inspection
month placed on sticker; in-
spection of exhaust system; in-
spection of emission system; in-
spection fee \$2.00.

Instead of the usual April 15
deadline, inspections will come
due one year after the current
month of inspection. This will
tend to take all the registered
vehicles in Texas and prorate
them equally among the twelve
calendar months to be inspected.
This will establish an annu-
al inspection month for each vehicle
to be inspected and prevent the
log-jam of over six million reg-
istered vehicles to be inspected
at one time.

The new inspection sticker
will be placed inside of the
lower left-hand side of the
windshield instead of the usual
right side of the windshield.
The number of the current
month of inspection will appear
on the sticker. For example,
those issued in September will
have number 9 on them, Octo-
ber the number 10, and so on.
The color of the will change
each calendar year.

Two items have been added
to the inspection list -- the ex-
haust system and the exhaust
emission system. A car now
must be free from leaks. All
cars manufactured in 1968 or
later coming from the factory
equipped with the exhaust
emission system (commonly
known as the smog device),
still must have the device in
working order.
The exhaust system will be
checked to see that it has not
been removed or disconnected.
Vehicle owners are now urged
to start having their vehicles
inspected.

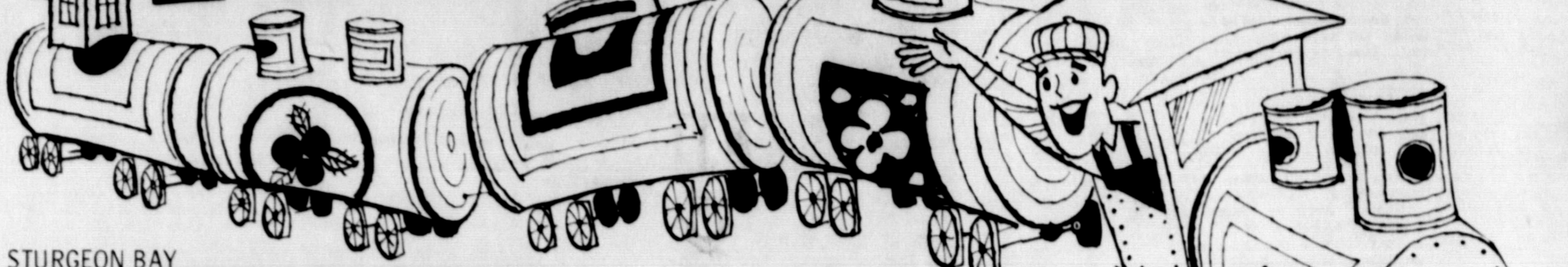
