This year it might pay to swat every one of them. Any merit any one might have is overshadowed by its faulty construction, with the possible exception of the soldiers' vote. The others deserve to fail.

It is strange that a thing advertised to be so gentle, sunshiny and good should have its sale prohibited on days of celebration. However, you must admit that law enforcement officers are in a good position to judge the effects of drinking.

Taking the 35-mile limit off auto speeds will make little difference, as there was not one motorist in a hundred that paid any attention to it. But the freeing of gasoline will mean many more highway wrecks. In the opinion of experts, we may expect a 25% increase in accidents right away. Old cars and old tires are not meant for speeding, but as long as the driver wants to take the chance, he will not only endanger his own life, but the life of every other person on the road.

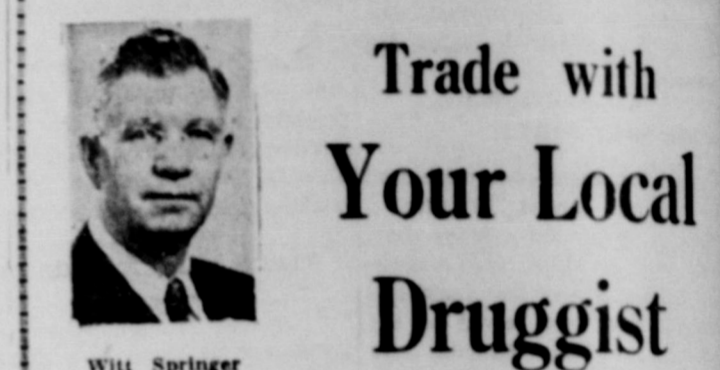

THE GIMLET AND G. I. JOE

The Gimlet, affectionate generic appellation for any small town newspaper, has cast aside its role as a stay-at-home, stick-in-the-mud, and is now stepping out to all the far-flung corners of the world. As a morale booster to homesick sailors, soldiers and marines, Red Cross nurses, SPARS and WACs, it is second to none. The weekly visit of the little printed sheet is something to look forward to, and if by any chance the mail is delayed and six or a dozen copies arrive at the same time, the boy from the home town will read for hours to catch up with the news. And while he is reading he no longer will be on a beach in Normandy or a jungle in New Guinea or a gloomy barracks in Australia. He will be transported to Pleasant Valley, Black Jack or New Hope, as he reads avidly about his old friends and neighbors, about the weather and the crops. Familiar names are a comfort to his eyes, news of home folks a balm to his weary mind. No doubt about it, the Gimlet does a lot for G. I. Joe.

Most eagerly of all, he looks for the page in the paper devoted to service men from the community, for it is a poor Gimlet indeed which does not have that much space set aside for "Yanks in the Ranks," "Uncle Sam's Helpers," or "Our Forces on Land, Sea and Air." Here Joe reads about his chums and boyhood companions where they are, what they are doing.

His big hope is that he will find someone he knows in his own camp, or stationed where he can look him up. Even the bully whom he heartily disliked in school days would be joyfully greeted now. Fondness for old acquaintances increases in ratio to distance traveled since last seen.

In reporting the news of service men, the editor of the Gimlet is strictly impartial. The promotion of a PFC to corporal is given just as much space as that of a commander to captain, or captain to major. Letters, generally handed in by proud parents, but sometimes sent direct to the editor, are printed. Some are brief and stilted and with much use of the

word SURE; some are exceedingly well written. A service page of the Gimlet may, on any one week, run the gamut of human experience. Engagement, marriage, birth death, voyage and battle, shipwreck, and suocor are all there. Fiction becomes pale and insipid in contrast to this section of real life.

Yes the Gimlet has outgrown its narrow home environment. It now has a global circulation. Most of the subscriptions for service men and women are paid for by parents or friends, though the recipients are not slow about writing and saying, "Please keep the paper coming—I don't want to miss any copies." Often it is sent air-mail. Usually there is a civic-minded person who sees to it that the town paper goes to any boy who does not have a relative to send it to him. He consults the editor to see that no service man is without a subscription. It keeps "the boys" in touch with home.—May Frink Converse, editor Wellsville (Kan.) Globe.

HOLD YOUR BONDS — DON'T CASH THEM NOW!

For your information, Secretary of the Treasury Vinson has issued the following statement:

"Treasury regards it as essential to orderly continuation of the Savings Bond program that industrial plants and business establishments with pay roll savings plans continue to service such plans, and that it is highly important that all authorized issuing agents continue their bond issuing activities. Continuance of these activities is especially important with plans for a Victory Loan drive already well under way. Please communicate immediately with all bond issuing agents in your district and express to them the Treasury's hope that they will continue to function in their present capacity."

In connection with rumors that consideration was being given to the freezing of Savings Bonds, the Secretary of the Treasury also issued the following statement:

"There is nothing that has emanated from the Treasury that would give substance to the rumor that consideration was being given to freezing Savings Bonds.

OF COURSE THEY WON'T BE FROZEN.

We have a contractual obligation with the purchasers of these bonds, and I think the Government, first of all, should keep its contract. Provision for redemption is made in the bonds."
