



It, therefore, seems to me that an honest effort to be holy is much better than spending time discussing the theological question of whether or

I am about to illustrate my meaning by a story which I hesitate to use because I do not approve of making a joke of a passage of Scripture. But the story, even if it should evoke a smile, so emphasizes a point in my mind I feel justified in using it.

In slave times an old Negro was in the habit of hearing his muster preach Sunday morning and then preach to the colored folks from the same text in the afternoon. preached from the text, 1 Cor. Lord Jesus, let him be anathema. colored preacher said, "Bredren, I don' know as I can zackly quote de text what de master used dis mawnin'. But as nigh as I can rikerlect it was dis here-'If any man love not de Lord Jesus, let him be a nabbin' at it and a grabbin' at it."

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That is exactly my feeling about this holiness question. If any man is a Christian and has set befor him the ideal of holy living, it seems to me that instead of spending his time discussing whether anybody ever did it or whether anybody ever will do it, he should be earnestly striving in that direction, doing just what the old Negro meant by "nabbin' at it and grabbin' at it.'


