A city-wide clean-up campaign was launched Tuesday with the Lions Club sponsoring the effort in cooperation with the city authorities.

Dr. Webb, county health officer, made an address to the club in which he said the only question in McLean is, do you want a polio epidemic or not? If not, then the fly must go. "Flies have been tolerated in the Panhandle," said Dr. Webb, "partly because we have not had a state inspector here, and it takes an epidemic or the threat of one to wake up the people. It has been proven that there are ten times as many cases of polio as are ever reported. This may mean that we have more cases in McLean right at the present time. Your local case is of a more serious type than the one in Pampa. As flies are known to be carriers of several serious diseases, the fly must be exterminated as a preventative measure."

Dr. Webb told of a case where a child is paralyzed for life because his family kept a hog pen within 200 yards of the residence. In a preliminary survey in this county, cafes have been found with open toilets in the kitchen; stores with maggots in the meat slicing machines, and numbers of other unsanitary things.

Federal and state authorities are afraid of fly-borne epidemics, and all places handling foods will be forced to clean up.

Sanitary engineers representing the state and federal health departments were present. Mr. Howard, state engineer, said that we must stop fly breeding in McLean. Every citizen must be contacted at his home or place of business and required to place his surroundings in a sanitary condition. The state does not recommend the use of lime in the war against flies, but does recommend DDT in proper form.

Mr. Howard suggested the use of loud speakers on the streets announcing those who have failed to cooperate with the clean-up drive. The speaker said that the state department would see that cafes, food stores and cold drink stands are cleaned up at once.

Mr. Harris, federal engineer, said that there is an enormous amount of fly-borne diseases prevalent this year.

Mr. Harris says the public health service demands a clean-up here, and mentioned the city of Lubbock where, after a three months campaign, it is practically impossible to find a fly, even at the stockyards.

Dr. Webb closed the program by saying that T. R. Moulton from the state health department will arrive in McLean this week and will stay on the job through the summer to see that stock pens, chicken pens and all sanitary rules are obeyed. He also stated that the city has sanitary jurisdiction on everyone within one mile from the city limits, and that county and state authorities will take care of violations outside this area. The doctor declared that we will have many cases of polio here in August unless the clean-up campaign is put on now.

He said he guessed McLean was no different to other towns in trying to enforce traffic rules.

Traffic fatalities are mounting as vacation season advances. Motorists must be careful in driving and try to make allowances for the other driver as well. One rule that is being violated every hour is passing on double stripes. It is only pure luck that a car can

get by before meeting another with the present heavy traffic. Waiting until the highway can be seen is good life insurance.

Several people have complimented an editorial on the multiplicity of courts. McLean has two courts, and all cases filed, along with other book work, do not take 10 hours a month to do. The county maintains a J. P. office which, if traffic cases were out (and they can be filed anywhere), would require much less time per month. Everything could be properly handled at the city hall at much less expense. The county commissioners canceled the Alanreed precinct some time ago for lack of business, combining the precinct with the McLean precinct No. 5.

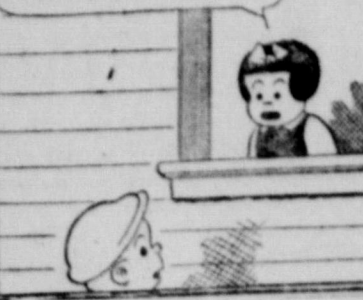
