

A large crowd attended the hospital mass meeting held at the high school Tuesday evening, with Dr. Michael Shadid of Elk City, Jkla., as the principal speaker.

Dr. Shadid told of the "numerous shortcomings of the present nedical system," stating that "the people have a right to determine what type of medical service they want.

"There has been more progress made in medical knowledge the past 50 years, as to diagnosis and treatment of the sick, than all the time before," said the speaker. The present medical situation of solo' doctors is outmoded and Group medical care untenable. now takes the plas of solo care. No one, two or three men can practice scientific takes a group of doctors, each one a specialist in his line. the group hospital plan no doctor has a financial interest in his patient. Coopenative care is the answer to the faults of the outmoded practice of medicine."

Dr. Shadid says that it would take 1,000 members at \$100 each for life memberships to build s hospital in McLean.

When asked for show of hands favoring the \$100 membership plan, practically everyone present endorsed it



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
