Sociologist Makes Lecture

Sociologist R. B. Johnston of Pampa spoke to a large audience at the First Presbyterian Church last week.

Mr. Johnston spoke on "The Parent and His Modern Child." He said that there are three things missing today that held the children of a generation ago in respect: pride in the development of the home, a multiplicity of duties, and a strict religious atmosphere.

"Older people should not talk about young people who happen to get into trouble, but should talk to them and make friends with them," said the speaker. "Parents are the primary ones to keep their children off the streets, but when they refuse that obligation, when our churches, schools and all the conscientious people must assume the responsibility. We need strong leaders who will cooperate in a common cause.

"Parents should personally center the shows they allow their children to see. The movies portray the undesirable side of life in too many pictures. Tennis courts, soft ball leagues, swimming pools and other supervised recreation are necessary for today's child. While yesterday's mothers were shouting in religious services, many of today's mothers are in honky tonks while their children fend for themselves."

Mr. Johnston was introduced by Mr. Harris King, who gave the subject of the meeting and told of some local conditions.

"We have a distressing habit of refusing to see things we do not wish to see," said Mr. King. "The mentioned destructive acts, improper entertainment and the need of better schooling. It is sad state of affairs when the majority of our high school graduates enter colleges and universities and cannot make the grades due to improper background and preparatory work. If we need more money for better schools, then that money must be forthcoming."

The program was sponsored by the Fifth Tuesday Council of Church Women.

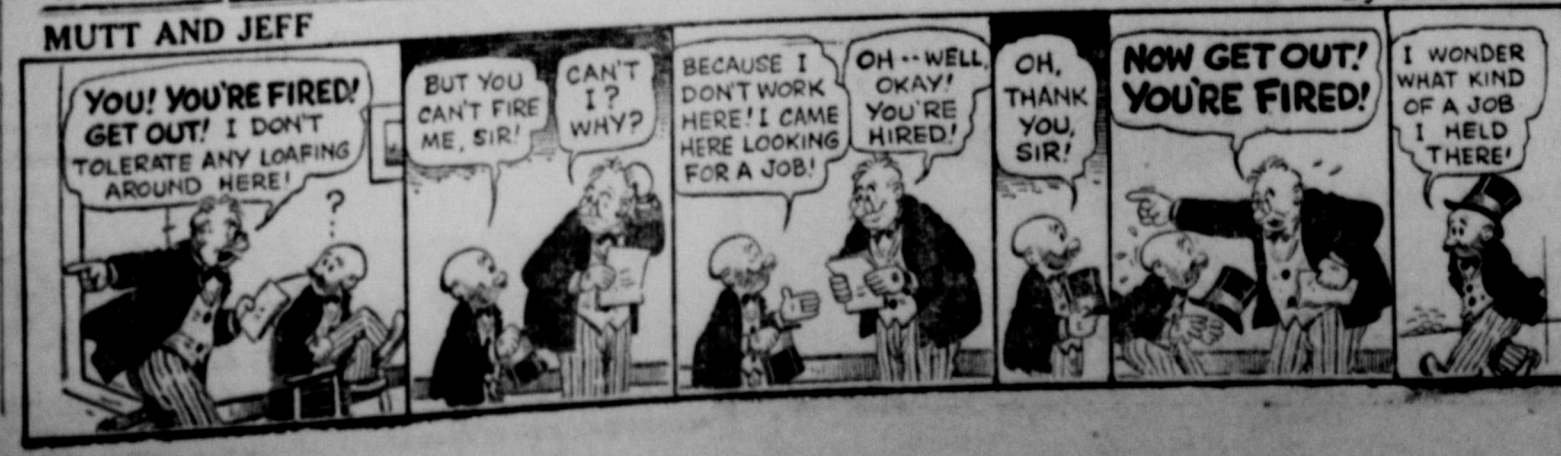
HICKORY GROVE

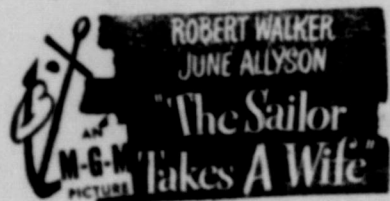
