Known As Springwood

A mile south of Hyde Park is the ancestral Roosevelt home which the late President deeded to the United States government. There Franklin D. Roosevelt is buried in a rose garden, separated by a hemlock hedge which houses his papers, memen toes and many personal belongings. The entire estate, consisting of nearly 1,000 acres, originally was given the name Springwood because

of the springs whose waters rushed

down the hills to the Hudson. The oldest, central part of the 40room family home has been covered with stucco, and two projecting stone wings have been added. Through the years the outside walls have become heavy with ivy. A semi-circular portico with doric columns forms the main entrance, and atop the roof is a "captain's walk. Beyond the lawns, dotted with shrubs and trees, is visible the southward sweep of the Hudson's "Long Reach," an 11-mile straight sailing course mentioned in the journal of one of Henry Hudson's crew.


