Storm sash increase the life of heating equipment, reducing the load by 20 per cent by actual test, when all windows are equipped with storm sash. Long periods of highintensity firing are reduced and life of equipment prolonged. Another talking point for storm sash that appeals to economy-minded homemakers is the fuel saving that results. Per cent of savings vary with the climate and area of glass, but tests indicate fuel savings of 20 per cent when all windows are fitted with storm sash.


