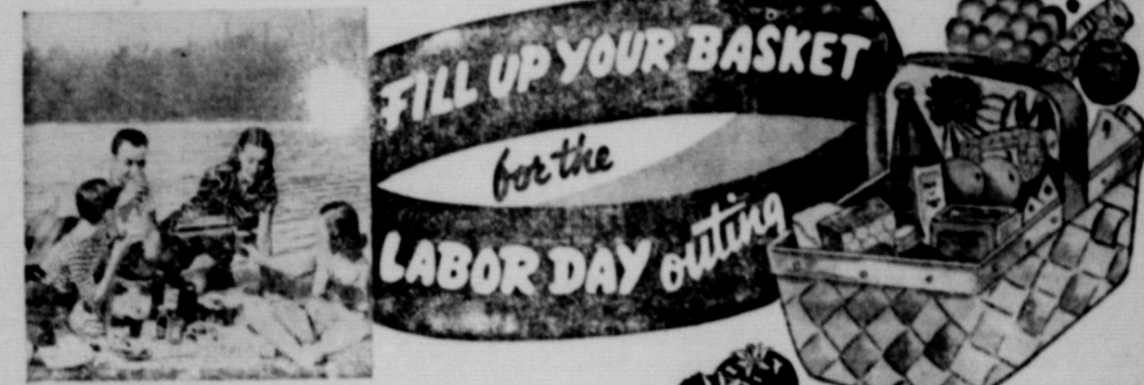

### Spraying of Potatoes Will Increase Returns

Spraying of potatoes is a paying proposition, says Henry C. Moore, research specialist in potato production at Michigan State college. "We have proved in experimental and test plots that spraying with DDT improves the quality of the potatoes and steps up production from 60 to 100 bushels per acre," he stated.

The specialist says the time to start is when the plants are four to five inches high. Spraying every 7 to 10 days is recommended, and more frequently if the season is wet. DDT will control the flea beetle very well. The potato leaf hopper, which causes the edge and tip of the leaf to turn brown and curl, also is effectively exterminated with the new killer. This hopper causes severe damage after haying time as it leaves the hay fields and migrates to the potato fields after hay is cut.

Contrary to the opinion of some, DDT can be used effectively with Bordeaux mixture or a fixed copper solution, Moore says. The Bordeaux mixture or fixed copper solution will control blight. DDT should be added last and the solution sprayed as heavy as 125 gallons to the acre. The tractor operator should drive slowly to get adequate coverage.

Too often, Moore has observed, farmers quit spraying too quickly.

### Combat Photographer Hunts Congo Gorillas

Experience gained by Kenneth Elk of New York as a combat photographer in Europe will be utilized in a projected trip to the Belgian Congo where he will fulfill a long-cherished ambition to make color pictures of gorillas. Elk, who rose in the army from private to first lieutenant, won the bronze star and cluster and the Purple Heart.

He has invested \$12,500 in a big motion picture camera, a hand movie camera and two still cameras, a sedan car and a trailer, besides other necessary equipment.

He will be gone about 11 months. Going via North Africa, Elk intends to follow the Nile river as far as he can on his way to East Africa. When he gets to the Congo he will leave his car. Then, with two helpers he will climb the mountains in the hope of getting pictures of the gorillas, which, he said, have never been photographed, except for brief flashes.

Elk said that the gorilla is an elusive animal and that the mountain species is the largest. Their lairs are in the jungles about 4,000 to 10,000 feet up the mountains, on the borders of British Uganda and the Congo.

### Six Ranges in Area

Six principal ranges are located in the Lake Superior ore region. They are the Marquette range in Michigan, the Menominee and Gogebic ranges which lie across the Michigan-Wisconsin border, and the Vermilion, Mesabi and Cuyuna ranges in Minnesota. Possession of most of these important areas came to the U. S. through interesting circumstances. Under the Treaty of Paris in 1763 the northern boundary of the United States was fixed roughly. Inaccurate maps and a pencil in the hand of Benjamin Franklin played a part in locating the wilderness inside the United States. In 1842 the boundary was fixed definitely by the Webster-Ashburton treaty.

### Develop Hong Kong

During the century of British rule, health protection, land reclamation projects, new roads and industrial and commercial development made Hong Kong one of the empire's leading outposts. By the 1930s, this former "plague spot" of the tropics had been turned into a world port, equipped with huge docks, warehouses, cranes and other facilities for handling its immense trade and traffic. Its population had grown toward the million mark. Its industries included shipbuilding, factory processing of such products as tin, sugar, rice, and manufacture of furniture, paper, glass, rope, textiles, cement.

### To Educate Children

An intensified program of education, especially for children and youth, now is under way in Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Costa Rica and Nicaragua. Mexico and Guatemala are turning their attention to conquering illiteracy, for which purpose Mexico has evolved an effective primer for person-to-person teaching. Story books for children also are planned. Guatemala, Costa Rica and Nicaragua are concentrating on enlarging their public circulating libraries, especially in the field of children's books many of which are from the United States.

### DDT Recommended

DDT, the new insecticide, is the perfect answer to the bedbug problem, says the department of agriculture in a statement recommending DDT for this purpose. If DDT is applied properly as a 1 per cent spray or as a 10 per cent powder on mattresses, beds and chicken houses, these places will remain free of bedbugs for six months or more, according to the department. Washable DDT powder may be used in water as a spray, but leaves an unattractive residue.

### Magnetic Hill

The so-called magnetic force in hills is imaginary. Cars do not climb them without power from their engines. There are several of these "magic or magnetic hills" in the United States but the magic exists solely in an optical illusion. Usually the hill is that part of a long steep slope which has less gradient than the slope as a whole and the sharp contrast to the incline of the surrounding territory contributes to the impression that the hill slopes slightly upward instead of actually sloping slightly downward.

### Mending Thread

Ravel some yarn from an old stocking to get the best possible mending thread for snags and runs in hose. The stocking yarn is of lighter weight than ordinary mending thread, and will be less conspicuous. Thread from old nylon stockings (if anybody has them old enough to be retired) makes the best and strongest mend, but a heavy, not-so-sheer rayon stocking gives an excellent thread for mending.

### Bartholomew Fair

Bartholomew Fair, held on the outskirts of London, was founded early in the 1100s and continued until the middle of the 19th century. Back in the 13th century actors took advantage of its throngs to produce miracle plays. In 1305 are references to still-walkers and to a woman who "balanced herself head downwards on the points of swords."

### Clean Under Bedding

Once a month, mattresses and boxsprings should be cleaned either with a soft brush or a vacuum cleaner attachment, and open coil springs should be cleaned with a cloth or vacuum cleaner attachment. Mattress and spring covers can be made or purchased inexpensively. If these are used, they should be laundered monthly.

### Anchor Rugs

If your rugs have a tendency to curl at the edges, sew weights or discarded rubber fruit jar rings on the under side to keep rugs flat. If you polish floors with a rubbing wax, spread a thin, even coat of wax and rub it thoroughly. Better still, buy non-skid wax.

### U and V

"V" was considered to be better adapted to engraving in stone and metal than the flowing U and was also thought, by many, to be more dignified. Furthermore, it is a survival of the time when both were forms of the same letter, the earlier form being V.

### Cooked Mushrooms

Mushrooms that are fresh and tender need not be peeled before cooking. Just wash them thoroughly and be sure the heat is evenly applied. It usually takes only about five minutes of cooking for the mushrooms to be thoroughly done.

### Grating Citrus

When grating lemons or oranges use a large grater and work on waxed paper. Hold fruit lengthwise—grating only the yellow part of the peel—and move diagonally across grater on long strokes, so peel won't stick to grater.

### Inaccurate Anecdote

The fact that an anecdote has been publicly and inaccurately attributed to a person will give him no right of action unless he can establish that his reputation has been injured thereby or his right of privacy unduly invaded.

### Sacred Mountain

Southeast of the city of Kars near the Iranian border, is Mount Ararat—sacred mountain of Armenia and traditional resting place of Noah's ark. It rises almost 17,000 feet.

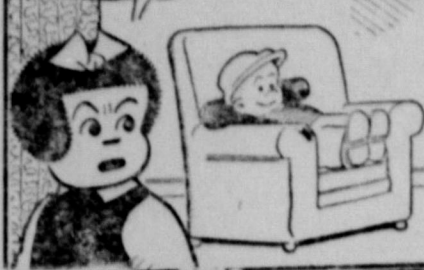

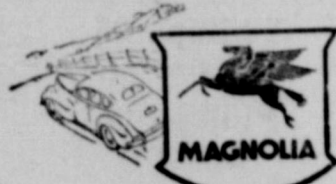
