Fire losses for 1946 already top eight full years of the past fourteen, with only six months' record compiled. Such losses are staggering and prevention methods are indciated, as most fires can be prevented if proper precautions are taken.

Weekly newspapers may not distribute "magazines" in part of their circulation each week. Each and every copy of the paper mailed must contain the same matter. Outside subscribers must receive the same content as home folks. This is a ruling of the post office department.

The first three months of this year saw 8,120 persons killed in traffic accidents. On the basis of these figures and current trends, it is believed that 38,000 will have been killed by the end of the year. Highways have become death traps and a motorist using them.


