## State Capital News

January's draft call for Texas... That is up 117 from Dec. 1968.

Under the new Selective Service... men from 19 to 26, whose last names start with the letter "J" will be the first.

Under the new lottery procedure... 365 capsules are dropped into the hopper. Each capsule has a number representing a year in the year. These are selected as birth dates.

Order in which capsules are drawn... which men with matching birthdays will be drafted next.

In addition to a valuable men... all those 18 years and under 26.

Interest in developing the small town as a safety valve of galloping urbanization is gaining momentum.

At least eight former law makers have been given state jobs to help them complete their eligibility for state retirement pay.

Agency has no money to go further into the program. Technique employed is a modification of "seeding" practices.

High Court was asked to reconsider its finding that a young Army Sgt., Albert Buckman Wharton II, is sole heir to Electra Waggoner's \$45 million estate located in six North Texas counties.

Secretary of Agriculture, promptly announced the counties are eligible for emergency assistance under the livestock feed program.

## License Tags To Go On Sale Mid-December

Jack Back, assessor-collector for Gray County, reported today that notices from the State Department of Motor Vehicles indicate that license tags for 1970 will be in the mail within the next few days and will go on sale around mid-December.

Special personalized license plates may be purchased by making application with the Texas Highway Commission, Motor Vehicle Division in Austin.

Back added that application for personalized tags are also available in the tax office. A \$10 levy over the set license fee is required of those ordering special tags.

The tags are then mailed to the local tax office where the license fee is collected.

The tax office official added that about 35 such tags are issued each year in Gray County.

## Voter Registration Lagging For 1970

An estimated 3,000 Gray County voters have returned voter registration certificates for 1970 to the tax office, according to Jack Back, collector-assessor.

Jan. 31 is the registration deadline for the estimated 13,000 Gray County voters. Back urges voters to pick up registration forms at the office. Most tax payers received certificates with their tax assessments earlier in the year. These should be mailed to the earliest date possible.

## Diann Rives Speaks To Lawmakers

Diann Rives, high school senior and daughter of Mabel Back Rives and Wayne W. Rives of Gathersburg, Maryland and grand daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Back of McLean, represented the Youth of Montgomery County in a joint session of the House of Delegates and the State Senate recently. Diann spoke to lawmakers in support of a referendum to be placed on the state ballot allowing the voters to decide if the youth of 19 years be given the right to vote.

Miss Rives said in part: "Isn't it really up to the voters of Maryland to decide a matter of such a major concern? . . . Must this change come through federal procedure before the State of Maryland takes action? . . . The youth of today believe in taking part, voting their opinions, and working for what they believe right. They are the forgotten idealists. Today's youth has been called the best prepared, the best educated, and the most talented students ever produced in this country. . . . There are millions of youth between 19 and 21 who have taken on all the responsibilities of adulthood, they have jobs and families. They pay taxes. They serve in the military. . . . I urge you to support the amending of the voting age requirement."

## NEWS from County Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

The Texas Farm Bureau in their State Convention held in San Antonio on Nov. 16-19 voted some of the greatest changes ever voted in what has been described as the best attended and most active ever held.

They voted to recommend an extension of the agri adjustment act of 1965 without any payment limitation. This represented the most drastic policy shift since the early fifties when they abandoned the ninety percent parity concept.

In voting to support the agri act of 1965 which is the present farm program we now have joined twenty two other major national farm organizations that either confirmed their solid support for the present program or in existence, it will be interesting to see what the national Farm Bureau is doing at the national convention held this week in Washington, D. C. If the national organizations should go the way the Texas delegation goes this will mean every national farm organization of any size is supporting an extension of the present program. If they do not the National Farm Bureau will stand alone in their opposition to the present program. It will be interesting to see just what direction the National Farm Bureau will take. By next week there should be some releases out on this issue.

### COMMUNIST RULES OF REVOLUTION

In May, 1919, at Dusseldorf, Germany, allied forces captured a very significant document: "Communist Rules for Revolution." As you read these "Rules" now, 50 years later, keep in mind what you are reading and hearing everyday via news media:

- A. Corrupt the young; get them away from religion. Get them interested in sex. Make them superficial; destroy their ruggedness.
- B. Get control of all means of publicity, thereby:
  1. Get people's minds off their government by focusing their attention on athletics, sexy books and plays and other trivialities.
  2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance.
  3. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding the latter up to contempt, ridicule, obloquy.
  4. Always preach true democracy, buy seize power as fast as ruthlessly as possible.
  5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.
  6. Promote unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of the government toward such disorders.
  7. By specious argument cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues, honesty, and sobriety.
- C. Cause the registration of all fire arms on some pretext with a view to confiscating them and leaving the population helpless.

### Drivers Slow Up for Safety

Motorists are cautioned to be extra alert when driving in twilight during the short winter days, because more traffic accidents occur during the early evening hours than at any other period of the day or night.

The American Oil Company advises its own drivers to be aware of the major differences between summer and fall driving.

Motorists will do more driving during hours of darkness, and night-time driving has proven to be more hazardous than daylight driving. The driver can see only as far as his headlights can reach, and he can see little to the left or right.

A good driver will drive 10 miles per hour below the daytime speed limit, without exception; be alert more than usual to other vehicles and pedestrians, and be especially watchful at intersections.

**Safe Driving And You**  
 By DPS Safety Officer Chester Fant

Q--For what purposes may a vehicle with farm tags be legally used?  
 A--It is to be used by the owner to transport his own farm products to market and to carry equipment, tools, etc. from market to farm. It may also be used as a passenger vehicle for members of the family to attend church, school, to visit doctors and for other necessities of the home or family. Nothing in the foregoing shall be interpreted as permitting the use of a farm licensed vehicle in connection with other gainful employment.

Q--Does the law require a vehicle to be equipped with a horn?  
 A--Yes. Every motor vehicle when operated on a public highway shall be equipped with a horn in good working order capable of being heard under normal conditions for a distance of 200 feet. The horn on your vehicle should be used only to insure safe operation of the vehicle.

Q--What is the law in regard to shooting from a public road?  
 A--No person who shoots or discharges any gun, pistol or firearm in, on, along, or across any public road in this state shall be fined not more than \$100.00.

Q--According to law what is the driver of a vehicle facing a yield sign required to do?  
 A--The law requires a vehicle facing a yield sign to give way to vehicles on the protected highway and to pedestrians legally crossing the roadway. After stopping, the vehicle may not proceed until the way is clear on the protected highway.

Q--According to highway law when are you not to drive left of the center line on a two-lane, two-way roadway even when passing?  
 A--When you are within 100 feet of the approach to a bridge, a tunnel, a railroad crossing, an intersection, a viaduct, while crossing an intersection or railroad crossing, before coming within 100 feet of an oncoming vehicle, and when within a marked no-passing zone.

Residents Asked To Not Remove Signs  
 Boyd Meador, mayor of McLean reported to the News office and requested that we ask the people of McLean to please stop removing the traffic signs from the city streets.

A number of yield and stop signs are missing and this is hazardous to the traffic and drivers and may result in a serious or fatal accident. Removing these signs is not only dangerous but is also against the law and could lead to a prison term.
