A "hail suppression" program proposed for six West Texas counties around Lubbock is feasible, a report to the Texas Water Development Board

Tom Henderson of Atmosphe rics, Inc. of Fresno, Calif., made the study for the state board, as part of its job of deve loping interest in weather modification projects.

But John Carr, assistant chief engineer for the board, said the

agency has no money to go further into the program. Technique employed is a modifica tion of "seeding" practices. A "bomb" made with silver iodide is dropped into clouds with hail potential. The nuclei of the chemical "compete" with other nuclei in the cloud for what is available. Goal is to prevent hailstones from forming, or at least reduce them in size. Cost of the program is estimated at \$100,000 a year.

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

Q--For what purposes may a vehicle with farm tags be legal ly used? A -- It is to be used by the

owner to transport his own farm products to market and to carry equipment, tools, etc. from market to farm. It may also be used as a passenger vehicle for members of the family to attend church, school, to visit doctors and for other ne-

cessities of the home or family. Sunday morning, Rev. George Nothing in the foregoing shall be interpreted as permitting the use of a farm licensed vehicle in connection with other gainful employment. Q--Does the law require a

A--Yes. Every motor vehicle when operated on a public highway shall be equipped with a horn in good working order capable of being heard under normal conditions for a distance of 200 feet. The horn on your vehicle should be used only to insure safe operation of the vehicle.

than \$100.00. Q -- According to law what is the driver of a vehicle facing

a yield sign required to do? A -- The law requires a vehicle facing a yield sign to give way to vehicles on the protected highway and to pedestrians legally crossing the roadway. After stopping, the vehicle may not proceed until the way is clear on the protected highway.

Q--According to highway law when are you not to drive left of the center line on a twolane, two-way roadway even when passing?

A--When you are within 100 feet of the approach to a bridge, a tunnel, a railroad crossing, an intersection, a viaduct, while crossing an intersection or railroad crossing, before coming within 100 feet of an oncoming vehicle, and when within a marked nopassing zone.
