Even a little "column" like this gives one an opportunity to strike a blow for the people of Texas. A few years ago, a bill was introduced in the legislature, which would have had the effect of confiscating 3,000,000 acres of land rightfully belonging to the public schools and placing that land in the hands of oil companies. These tracts were known as vacancies and their potential mineral wealth gave them a value which might reach \$100,000.000.

School leaders were fighting to protect the birthright of the boys and girls. Through this "column" the facts were told to about a million readers of 200 weeklies. The article was quoted in debate in the legislature and the bill was modified to safeguard the rights of the school children of this state.



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THE TEACHER SITUATION

A SURVEY recently completed by the Texas State Teachers Association reveals that this state is in need of abou. 9,000 qualified teachers to relieve our over-crowded classrooms, to add to the curriculum many subjects that have been eliminated during the war years, and to replace substandard personnel.

The turn-over in the teacher personnel in the public schools for this year is the greatest in the history of the state. More than 25 per cent, or 9,272 teachers, were new in their jobs when schools opened this fall.

There is but one reason for these astonishing figures, and that reason, of course, is money. A large number of people who used to follow the teaching profession, many of whom had studied for and planned to make this profession their life work, have turned to other professions, simply because they were unable to make sufficient money as teachers, and because they found they were able to do much better financially in other lines of work.

The retiring president of the state association. Superintendent Charles M. Rogers of Amarillo, has commented the following: "Today if our public schools could employ immediately all of the students in the colleges and universities of Texas that are preparing to be teachers, we would not relieve our great shortage. I am sure that we do not have in our Texas institutions of higher learning 9,000 people today who are preparing to become teachers. We must raise salaries in Texas high enough to encourage those now in college to enter teaching as their chosen pro-
