

The average salary of classroom teachers in Texas in 1945-46 was \$1593. The average earnings per full time employee in private industry in 1945 was \$2595. The beginning salary in the professional and scientific services of the federal civil service is \$2645 for the college graduate without experience. Salary studies have shown that the median professional employee in the federal service is classified in Grade 3 with a basic salary of \$4150. By 1945, per capita income in the various states of the country had increased 113% while the teachers' average salary had increased 31%.


