

Give Plants Room For Good Growth

Growing house plants sometime need to be reposted, due to their outgrowing the old pot, says Ray ord Houston, Oklahoma A. and M. horticulturist.

When the root system com eletely fills the smaller pars, the oil dries out too fast, and there s also the possibility that the tense root system will remove all the nutrients in the soil.

Of course, these nutrients can be replaced with commercial fertilizer, but in all probability the old pot will have to be replaced ater by a larger one.





THOMAS E. DEWEY

ALTHOUGH many people believe that the Republican party could have made a much better choice, particularly as far as vote-getting goes, in naming their candidate, Governor Thomas E. Dewey made some wise remarks in his acceptance of the nomination Thursday night.

The brief address by the New York governor, whom many believe will be elected to the highest office in the land next November, had as its theme "unity."

It was a good speech. Governor Dewey emphasized the importance of unity, not only within the Republican party but throughout all of the U.S. He didn't actually repeat it will. the old saying, but he meant that "in unity there is

Among other things which he said, Governor Dewey made it rather clear that he is not an isolationist but that he is certainly in favor of the European recovery program. As one commentator put it, Colonel Robert McCormick, the avid isolationist, is definitely against the Republican nominee and this fact is an asset to Dewey.

The Republicans also showed that they are out to win the election in November by nominating Governor Earl Warren of California for the vice presidency. Thus they have chosen an East-West combination for vote-getting purposes. Governor Warren apparently has done a good job in California, judging by the enthusiasm of Californlans for him

Whether the Republicans will elect their candidates this year is still in doubt. The Republicans sincerely believe this is "their year," but the Democrats believe differently. President Truman will in all likelihood be the Democratic nominee, and most people, including a lot of Democrats, do not believe he has a chance of being elected to the presidency. However, that is to be determined by voters in November, not by writers in July.



Beautiful Lawns Require Attention

Lawns require care and attention to management details for best results, just like other crops, according to Robert Ealy, landscape specialist at Oklahoma A and M. College.


Lawn grasess hould be sodded sprigged, or seeded in a wellprepared seed bed to which organie matter such as well rotted manure has been applied and plowed under. This is followed by discing, harrowing, and firming of the soil, prior to actual planting. Watering will be especially necessary the first year until the grass is established.


Frequent mowings (not too close) will encourage creeping grasses to spread and cover the surface quickly. The spring following planting and before growth starts, an application of commercial nitrogenous fertilizer such as nitrate of soda at the rate of four pounds per 1000 square feet is beneficial.

Sour soils may benefit from the application of ground limestone occasionally. Forty pounds per 1000 square feet, spread in the late winter every three or four years will suffice for most soils. To be sure of the need o amounts have a soil test made of samples from your lawn.




