Cox, state health officer, said. "And the excessive use of tobacco, coffee, tea, or other heavy stimulant is often a contributing cause."

Malfunction of the heart is a correctable condition, the health officer said, insofar as the sources of infection may be located and eliminated, as in the case of bad teeth or tonsils. Incurable organic frequent.

Strict adherence to competent medical advice will eliminate much vacation in Kansas and Colorado, worry about either functional or organic heart conditions, Dr. Cox said. He added that such adherence would unquestionably reduct deaths from heart disease

Danger signals on a refrigerator are an odor or smoke from the motor and blowing of the fuse, Hall continued.

Other than a few mechanical failures, the causes of fires in For proper maintenance, he advocated oiling the motor at proper intervals and not permitting combustible dust and dirt to occumulate on or around the motor.

"There are refrigerators equipped with inherent overheating devices consisting of a thermostat designed to disconnect the motor circuit before the motor gets hot enough to burn up, and there have been no reported fires in these electrical refrigerators," Hall advised housewives. Overheating comes from overloading an electric circuit or outlet.

The popular belief that the refrigerant starts fires is untrue, the commissioner stated. In fact, the refrigerant most extensively used, actually has fire extinguishing properties, and when it escapes, the danger is not one of fire but of an irritant gas.




