School Registration Details Announced

Details for registration for this year's term of school in McLean were released this week by Logan Cummings, local superintendent. The program at the high school will be as follows:

September 2: 9 to 12 o'clock, registration of seniors; 1 to 4 o'clock, registration of juniors.
September 3: 9 to 12 o'clock, registration of sophomores; 1 to 4 o'clock, registration of freshmen and 8th graders.
At the grade school, all students from the 1st through the 4th grades will register on September 2.
Buses will run tentative routes the same as last year on registration schedule, to arrive at the schools by 9 o'clock in the morning. Students in the grade school will not come back until Monday, September 6. This will permit an arrangement of schedules according to the number of students registering at the high school are to bring 25 cents for an ink fee (this includes those in the 8th through the 12th grades). The payment of the fee entitles them to ink for the year, and a supply of ink always be handy for use.
Teachers for the coming year have all been contracted, although some teaching assignments have not been made, Cummings said. The assignments are almost completed, but there are one or two details to be worked out as

Eight Injured In Auto Crash Near McLean

Eight persons, two of whom were from McLean, were injured in a head-on collision of two automobiles about 1 1/2 miles east of McLean shortly after noon last Saturday. None were seriously injured.
Those from McLean who suffered injuries were Paul A. Pierson and his step-daughter, Jean Terry. In the car with them, and also receiving injuries, were Mrs. Clark Lawrence and Miss Alice Lawrence, both of Woodward, Okla. They had arrived in McLean Friday for a visit in the Pierson home.

Injured in the second car were Mrs. Sarah Miller of San Bernardino, Calif., Ed Watkins, Mary Dayton, 7 years of age, and her father, Mr. Dayton, of Indio, Calif. Mrs. Dayton was also in the car but was not injured.
Pierson suffered a sprained back and abrasions of the knees. Miss Terry suffered minor shock and injuries to a hand. Miss Lawrence received lacerations on the face and abrasions of the knees, and Mrs. Lawrence received a cut under her chin and lacerations of the face.

In the California car, Mrs. Miller suffered a cut over the right eye. Watkins was also cut on the face and received a fractured knee. The young girl, Mary Dayton, suffered a fractured arm and cuts about the face, and her father was also cut on the face. Two young babies in the California car were uninjured.
Those in the Pierson car were treated here, and were reported as recuperating this week. The Californians were taken to Groom after treatment here, and are also recuperating.

The accident occurred when the Pierson car, driven by Miss Terry, attempted to pass a house trailer and car as the vehicle slowed down. Two other cars in front of the Pierson car went around the trailer, one to the right and one to the left, when it slowed. Miss Terry attempted to go around to the left, to avoid collision with the rear of the trailer, but met the California car almost head-on, according to reports given to The News.
The front ends of both cars were badly damaged. The California car was a 1937 Buick, and was brought to McLean for repairs, and the 1948 Lincoln has been taken to Pampa for repair.

Scrimmage Game To Be Played Here Friday Night

For that's the time when the Tigers will meet a visiting team for a scrimmage game on the local gridiron.
The game will be between McLean and either Phillips or White Deer, Coach Al Duncan said this week. Both teams are desiring a practice session before the regular season starts, but it was not known late Wednesday which of the two teams would be here.
No admission to the practice game will be charged.

The visit of the portable X-ray unit of the State Department of Health proved a huge success in its one-day stop in McLean Tuesday at the Dysart Motor company building, and a total of 619 area residents took advantage of the free service.
The number to have the pictures taken was considerably greater than had been expected by those working in promoting the visit. The unit can care for from 1,000 to 1,500 in one day, but not nearly that many had been expected to attend.
As a comparison, the unit was in Clarendon one and one-half days, and only 289 people took advantage of the service. Clarendon is considerably larger than McLean.

The technicians accompanying the unit here were extremely pleased with the response of the public. They stated that the response was the best they had had in a town the size of McLean in a number of months.

U. S. Post Offices To Offer Air Mail Parcel Service

A new mail service, to be designated as Air Mail Parcel Post, will be inaugurated September 1. Postmaster Johnnie Back was notified this week by the U. S. Post Office Department.
Parcels may be sent under the present rules by air mail, but the regular air mail cost of five cents per ounce is charged, making the service expensive.
Under the new regulations, after September 1 parcels may be sent at a much lower rate. The air mail parcel post service rates are graduated, according to the weight of the parcels, the local postmaster explained.

Polls to Be Open In McLean from 8 to 7 O'Clock

Texas voters will ballot Saturday in the second Democratic primary, but it won't take Gray County citizens long to make their choices.
In the McLean area, voters will have a say-so only for the two offices of U. S. senator and county judge. There will be ten names on the ballot, but in this area, voters will have to read only four of them.
The two polling places in McLean will be the City Hall, for Precinct 5, and the Dysart Motor company, for Precinct 17. Polls will be open from 8 o'clock in the morning until 7 in the evening.

In the senator's race, which is collecting more interest this week than during any time since the first primary, Coke R. Stevenson, former governor, is opposed by Lyndon Johnson, present member of the U. S. Congress. Stevenson led in the first primary, Johnson was second, and George Paddy of Houston was third. There were 11 candidates listed on the ballot in the first primary.
For county judge, citizens have their choice of Bruce L. Parker, present county attorney, and John O. Pitts, Pampa businessman. The judge's race prior to the first primary, in which B. E. Ferrell and Henry L. Jordan were eliminated, attracted a great deal of attention. During the time since the first primary, however, the talk and the campaigning has been extremely light. Neither of the two candidates have been doing much campaigning in the McLean area.
The other six names to be on the ballot will be for voters in Precincts 1 and 2 only.
In Precinct 1, Joe K. Clarke, seeking re-election as commissioner, faces Alva G. King. King led in the first primary.
In Precinct 2, the Pampa precinct, Irvin Cole and J. W. 'Bill' Graham are in the run-off for the office of commissioner, now held by Wade Thomasson, who did not seek re-election.
Also in Precinct 2, Earl Lewis and Bill Langley are seeking the office of constable.
Most observers feel that voting in the county will be considerably lighter than in the first primary, despite the fact that there are local races. Voting throughout the state is expected to be light, since many counties have no local run-offs.

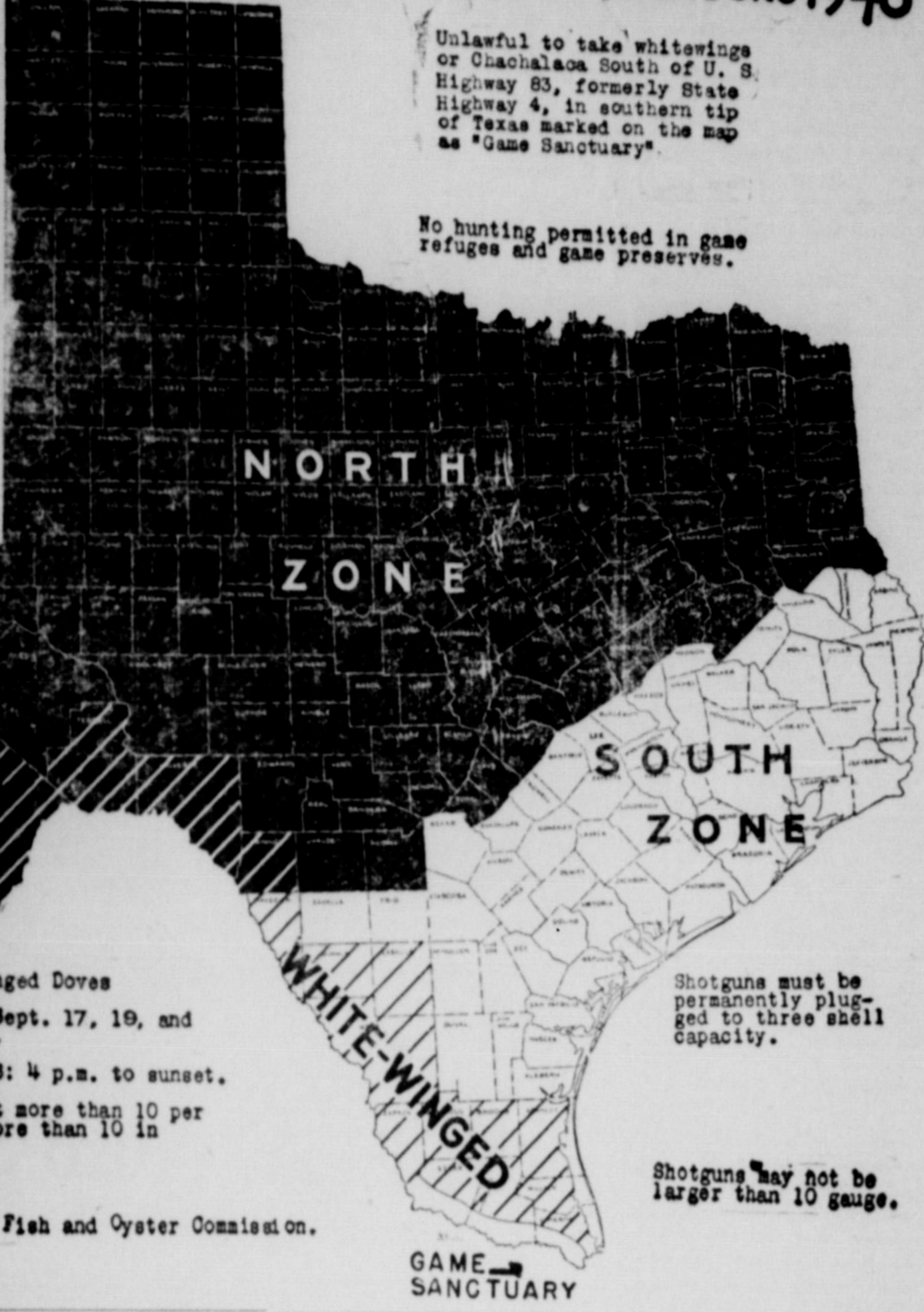

OPEN SEASON — NORTH ZONE:
 Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, both days inclusive. Shooting hours, one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 20 to Dec. 3, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSalle, and Borden counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 17, 19, and 21, from 4 p.m. to sunset, and from Oct. 20 to Nov. 30, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

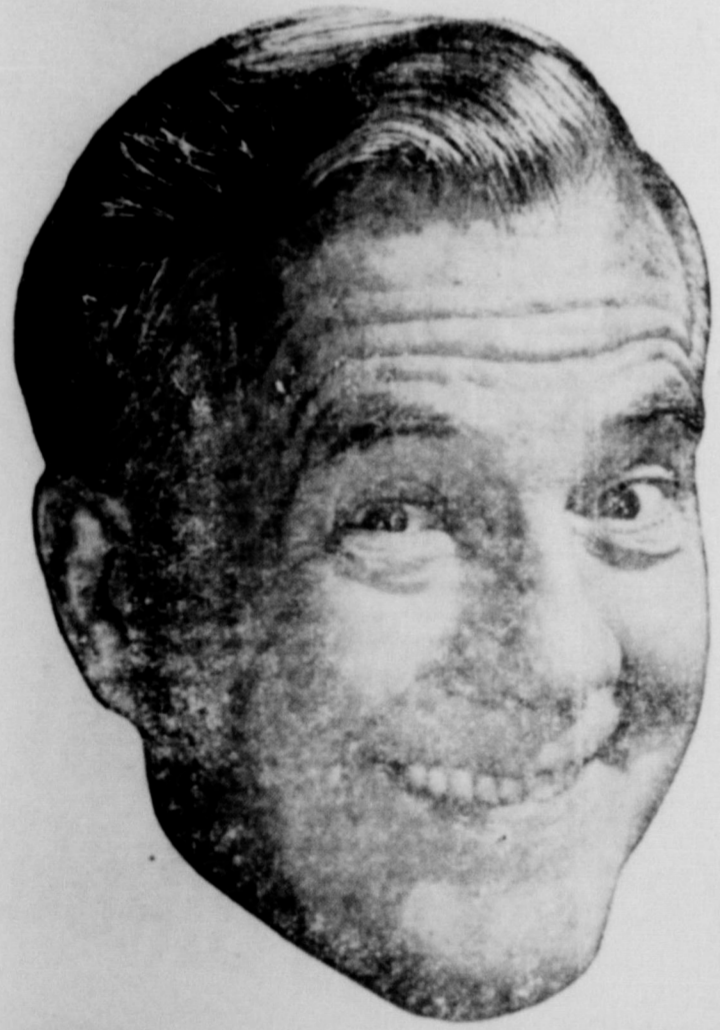

100 THINGS

MORE AND MORE people in the United States are beginning to realize the threat of Communism to the democratic way of life. But many still need to be convinced. That is the reason The News is publishing the series of questions and answers from the booklet, "100 Things You Should Know About Communism in the U. S. A.," prepared by the House Committee on Un-American Activities. Here are more of the questions and answers:

31. How many Communists are there in the United States?

There are approximately 80,000 out of a population of 145,340,000. J. Edgar Hoover has testified that "in 1917 when the Communists overthrew the Russian government there was one Communist for every 2,277 persons in Russia. In the United States today there is one Communist for every 1,814 persons in the country."

32. Why aren't there more?

Because the Communist party does not rely upon actual party membership for its strength. J. Edgar Hoover testified:

"What is more important is the claim of the Communists themselves that for every party member there are ten others ready, willing, and able to do the party's work. Herein lies the great menace of Communism."

"For these are the people who infiltrate and corrupt various spheres of American life. So rather than the size of the Communist party the way to weigh its true importance is by testing its influence, its ability to infiltrate."

33. How are they organized?

Primarily around something they call a political party, behind which they operate a carefully trained force of spies, revolutionaries, and conspirators. The basic fact to

remember is that Communism is a world, revolutionary movement and Communists are disciplined agents, operating under a plan of war.

34. Where are their headquarters in the United States, and who is in charge?

Headquarters are at 35 East Twelfth Street, New York City. William Z. Foster, of 1040 Melton Avenue, New York City, has the title as "Chairman of the Communist Party of the United States," but Foster is actually just a figurehead under control of foreign operatives unseen by and unknown by the rank and file of Communists.

35. What is the emblem of the Communist party in the United States?

The hammer and sickle. It is also the official emblem of the Soviet Government.

I didn't have any scales, but the thing must weigh in the neighborhood of 80 pounds—and that's lots of watermelon. As this is being written, I haven't cut the melon, but I know it will be delicious. Thanks a melon (I mean million), Mr. Hanner. Hope that you realize something from such a wonderful crop.

Saturday is the date of the second Democratic primary. Voters in the McLean area will have the opportunity to vote for their choice as county judge, and for their choice as U. S. senator.

Due to the complications which might result, I will not publicly take a stand on the judge's race. There are two candidates, Bruce L. Parker, the present county attorney, and John O. Pitts, well-known Pampa businessman. Undoubtedly both are good men. You can make your own choice.

In the senator's race, however, I will definitely be in favor of Lyndon Johnson, who is opposed for that office by former gov-

ernor Coke Stevenson.

As far as I know, there is nothing wrong with Stevenson. He served in the state legislature for a number of years, and then as lieutenant governor and then as governor. Without a doubt he performed well in each position, or he would never have attained his high ranking as a public official.

Johnson, too, has served his state well. He has been a member of the U. S. Congress for the past 11 years from his district. He has worked not only for his district, but for the state and the nation, as well.

The reason I believe he will make the best senator is that he already knows the ropes of Washington, and he is younger.

Knowing the ropes is very important. The people's favorite, W. Lee O'Daniel, found that out. There are too many politicians already there who know how to get things done for a new man in the congress or senate to be of much value for a number of years.

Along that line, fortunately voters have one candidate who is already experienced in Washington politics. He is Lyndon Johnson, of course, since he has been in the congressional work for a period long enough to give him

needed experience. He is very well respected in the legislative body, and would not require a great deal of time in the senate to give him respect there.

Johnson is considerably younger than Stevenson. I do not say that being younger makes him more qualified. Sometimes it is a disadvantage. But we in Texas are prone to elect a senator O'Daniel was an exception to the rule since he didn't even choose to run again this year, and then leave him in as senator for many, many years. Such is the case with Tom Connally, and such was the case with the late Morris Sheppard. Johnson, therefore, will have many useful

years ahead to serve. Stevenson, although I don't know his exact age, is in the neighborhood of 60. He possibly will be active for many years, but the probability is that he won't.

In other words, I plan to vote for Lyndon Johnson for U. S. senator.

But even if you don't vote for Johnson, I am hoping that you will cast your ballot. Ordinarily in a second primary, where there is only one local run-off—and lagging interest in that one—the voting is light. The interested side is the only side which votes. Therefore the interested side wins, and the result is not truly a representative vote of the people as a whole.

That is why I hope each of you will go to the polls Saturday and vote to your choosing.

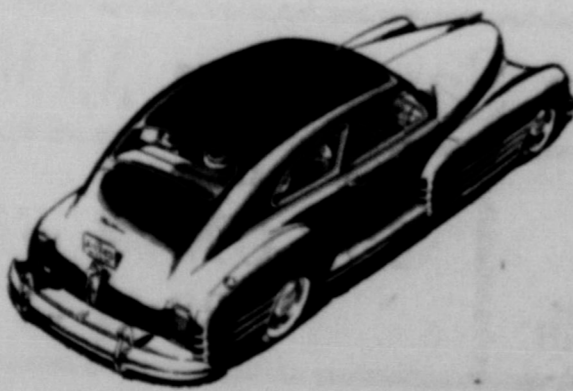

Surplus Buildings Released for Use in Grain Storage

All available surplus government buildings in West Texas will be released for emergency grain storage use in answer to requests to the War Assets Administration by a number of congressmen and farm organizations representing six midwestern and southwestern states, it was disclosed this week by Colonel Karl E. Wallace, regional WAA director at Grand Prairie.

In a move to make immediately available urgently needed storage space for grain sorghums and other products threatened with spoilage because of lack of warehousing facilities in the area, the War Assets Administration has designated the Grand Prairie office as focal point for throwing open surplus government facilities. The Denver and Kansas City WAA offices will relay storage requests from states in their regions.

The action followed wires sent to Jess Larson, War Assets Administrator, by Congressman George Mahon in behalf of his district and those of five other congressmen. Similar requests have been received by WAA in the last few days from Walker Hammond, head of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, and from other farm cooperatives, all indicating that the storage situation is critical.

"All suitable buildings not yet sold nor classed by the military as contaminated will be made available to ease this situation," Colonel Wallace said. He added that the program called for utilization of surplus facilities by organized agricultural cooperatives and bonded grain warehousemen. Structures to be used include

the greater portion of the sprawling Pantex Ordnance Works near Amarillo. Negotiations with WAA for transferring this installation to Texas Tech College are now in progress, but Texas Tech will cooperate in allocating maximum space, it was indicated.

No Nicknames On S. S. Cards

Full names, not nicknames, should appear on social security returns, J. R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo social security office, said. Employers should insist on seeing new workers' social security cards and copy the name and number from them. Nicknames are convenient among friends, but they lead to confusion in keeping social security records, continued Sanderson.

Many times employees when going to work give their employers their nicknames or an abbreviation of their real names. When this incorrect name is reentered on social security returns, the social security has to make a check because its file shows the correct, legal name of the wage earner

and the social security account number assigned to that name.

The result is that thousands of letters per year are mailed out to employers asking the names of workers as they appear on their social security cards. Identification is completed in most cases by correspondence. In others, personal visits are needed to effect identification. Despite all efforts, a small percentage are never identified. This means smaller social security benefits for those whose accounts are not completed.

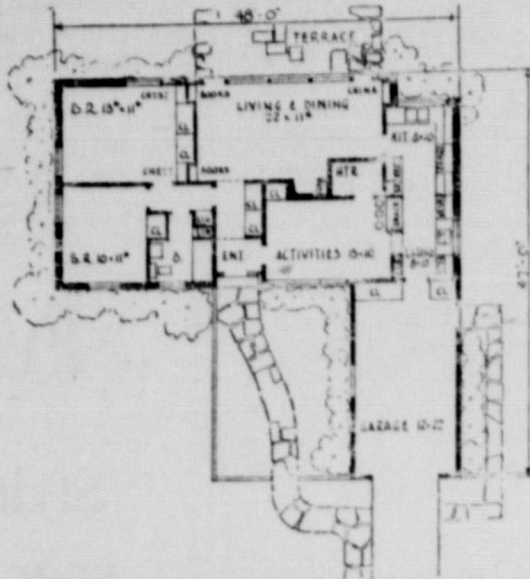
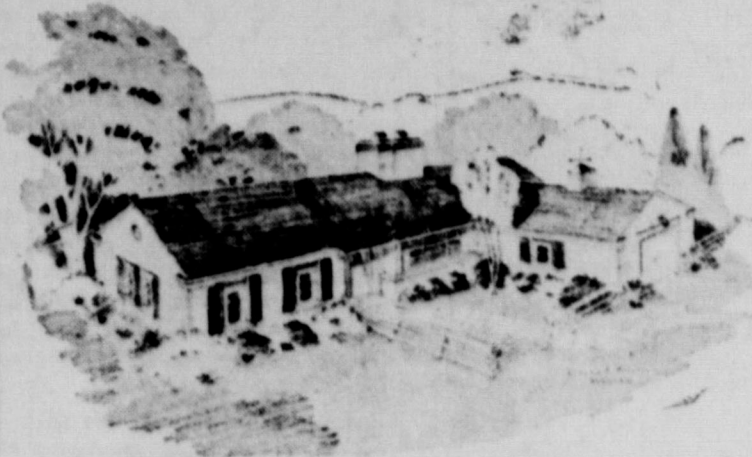
