





Surplus Buildings Released for Use In Grain Storage

All available surplus government buildings in West Texas will be released for emergency grain storage use in answer to requests to the War Assets Adninistration by a number of congressmen and farm organizations representing six midwestern and southwestern states, it was disclosed this week by Colonel Karl E. Wallace, regional WAA irector at Grand Prairie.

In a move to make immediately available urgently needed storage space for grain sorghums and ther products threatened with spoilage because of lack of warehousing facilities in the area, the War Assets Administration has designated the Grand Prairie office as focal point for throwing open surplus government facilities. The Denver and Kansas City WAA offices will relay storage requests from states in

The action followed wires sent have been received by WAA in the last few days from Walter Hammand, head of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, and from other farm cooperatives, all indicating that the storage situation is critical.

"All suitable buildings not yet sold nor classed by the military as contaminated will be made available to ease this situation.' Colonel Wallace said. He added Structures to be used include






