

Five Names Are Filed For McLean Offices

Five names for the five offices to be filled by voters in the city election on April 1 had been filed with City Secretary W. E. Bogan this week.

Officers whose terms expire this year are Boyd Meador, mayor; two aldermen, Charles E. Cooke and H. C. Rippey; W. E. Bogan, city secretary; and John Sparks, city marshal.

Meador's name has been filed for re-election; Cooke's name has been submitted for re-election as alderman; and Bogan's name has been filed for re-election as city secretary.

O. L. Barr's name has been filed for the other post of alderman, and F. J. Mooring, who is now night watchman, is offering for city marshal. Neither H. C. Rippey, now an alderman, nor John Sparks, now city marshal, have offered for re-election as yet.

According to the law, all names to be included on the ballot must be filed not later than Friday, March 21. City Secretary Bogan said this week.

The election was officially called this week by Mayor Meador, and E. L. Coombe has been appointed to serve as presiding officer. Coombe will select two judges to assist him in holding the election.

Qualified voters include all persons who are at least 21 years of age, who have lived in Texas for 12 months and in the city of McLean 6 months prior to the election, and who are qualified voters under the laws of the state.

John Deere Day To Be Monday

The annual "John Deere Day," sponsored by the local John Deere dealer, J. S. McLaughlin, and the John Deere company, will be held in McLean Monday. It was announced this week.

The entire program, including a lunch at noon, will be free to all farmers, McLaughlin said.

The lunch will be served at 12 o'clock at the McLean Implement company building, following which a free movie will be presented. The movie will feature Bob Burns in "The Windjammer," and a preview of the new John Deere tractors and equipment.

Andrews Wins Top Honors in Livestock Show

Dicky Andrews, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Andrews of McLean, carried away top honors when he exhibited the grand champion fat pig and the reserve champion calf in the Pampa Chamber of Commerce Junior Livestock Show and Sale Monday. The show was held in connection with the Top O' Texas Hereford Breeders Association show and sale.

Grand champion calf honors went to a calf shown by Billy Graham of Miami. Judging the entries was W. L. Stangel, dean of agriculture at Texas Tech, Lubbock.

Other local winners in the show were as follows:

- Senior fat pig division: 2nd place, Chester Goughly.
- Junior fat pig division: 1st, Andrews; 2nd, Kenneth Hambright; 3rd, Andrews; 4th, Arvin Smith; and 5th, Vernon Turner.
- Senior fat calf division: 1st, Andrews.

Andrews' entry in the junior fat calf division placed 11th.

In the sale of the calves, Andrews sold the reserve champion which came from the herd of J. L. Hess, for \$1 per pound, a total of \$24, to the Good Lumber company. His other calf was bought by the J. C. Penney company for 40 cents a pound, totaling \$29.80.

Andrews' grand champion pig sold for \$235 per pound to the Dial Tire company, bringing him \$167.65.

Other pigs owned by local boys sold for the following: Kenneth Hambright, 70 cents per pound; Chester Goughly, 60 cents per pound; Andrews (another entry), 55 cents; Arvin Smith, 55 cents; Vernon Turner, 50 cents; Turner (another entry), 50 cents.

Clyde Magee, local vocational agriculture teacher, pointed out that any boy or girl enrolled in a 4-H or FFA organization in Gray or Roberts Counties is entitled to enter the show.

West Theatre Brings to City 'Shining Hour'

In an attempt to operate less expensively, the Pampa office of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission has been instructed to discontinue taking claims in McLean. It was announced this week.

The order came from the state office in Austin, L. P. Fort, manager of the Pampa office, said.

Affected will be the claimants for all types of compensation claims, both veterans and civilians, Fort explained.

In the future, these claims will be taken in Shamrock, the manager said. "The necessity for this action is deeply regretted," Fort said, "and the claimants will be served as promptly as possible in Shamrock."

Fort explained that the matter is not one that can be decided by the Pampa office, but that such changes originate in the Austin office.

Mayor Boyd Meador stated this week that he has written the Austin office in an effort to have the visits re-scheduled, but as yet no answer has been received.

NOW—NOT LATER

THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE president, Guy Hibler, has called a meeting of all business men, to be held next Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the Lions Hall, when new officers and directors of the McLean chamber of commerce will be elected.

As we all know, the chamber of commerce here has been somewhat inactive during the past months, and, as a result, much trade and business which should have been coming to McLean has been going elsewhere.

Also, as we all know, unless something is done to stimulate business, unless something is done to induce people to trade in McLean instead of Pampa, Shamrock, Amarillo, or elsewhere, still more of our rightful share of the business will slip away. A drive of 20, 30, 40, or even 100 miles today doesn't amount to much.

One thing which we can do is support a chamber of commerce. At first it may seem somewhat costly for the returns we get. But in the long run, an active chamber of commerce, or any similar organization, will pay dividends. The News is of the opinion that we need an active chamber of commerce. The only way we can have one is for all business men to support it.

If you honestly believe that McLean has all the business it is due, then don't attend the meeting next Monday. If not, then be present. That is all the retiring president, Guy Hibler, is asking.

President Urges All Merchants To Be Present

A meeting of all business men will be held next Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock of the Lions Hall for the annual election of directors and officers of the McLean chamber of commerce, Guy Hibler, retiring president of the organization, announced this week.

The organization has been inactive during the past several months, Hibler pointed out, and there is a growing need for it to be re-activated.

"In announcing that the election will be held, I realize fully that little has been done during the past year by the chamber of commerce. For this, I take most of the responsibility, since I have been unable to give of my time to see that the organization functioned as it should," Hibler stated.

"I would also like to point out that I have had little or no cooperation in the handling of the chamber's affairs, and no person seemed willing to aid me in the many details required for the association to function properly.

"The meeting for next Monday has been called with some reluctance on my part, for I feel that too many of the business men will be absent, and that too many will want someone else to do the work.

"However, I do feel that the city of McLean badly needs such a group, and earnestly and sincerely urge every business man to be present. If only a few attend, as has been the case in similar meetings during the past few months, then we can be assured that the chamber of commerce will again die out.

"All business men are urged to attend, for only with a large representation can the proper man for the job be selected. We need an active chamber of commerce, but we can have one only if the business men are willing to cooperate, and also willing to give of their time in putting it over," Hibler concluded.

Local Cagers Sweep Series With Wheeler

The McLean Tiger basketball teams closed their scheduled season here Tuesday night when they met the Wheeler Mustangs in four fast and furious games.

A large, last-time crowd saw the Tigers win all four of the contests, although every game was a battle all the way and neither side admitted defeat until the final whistle.

The grade school boys did not fare quite so well and were in hot water during most of the game trying to keep up with the smaller but highly-spirited Wheeler boys. The final score was 22-21 in McLean's favor.

Vets Allowed More Time to Renew Policies

President Truman has signed legislation further liberalizing the National Service Life Insurance Act for some 10 million World War II veterans who have permitted their term policies to lapse. Veterans Administration announced Friday.

The new law gives the administrator authority to determine the conditions of reinstatement by administrative regulation. General Omar N. Bradley, administrator of veterans affairs, immediately announced that National Service Life Insurance term policies which have lapsed at any time may be reinstated by payment of two monthly premiums provided the holders are in as good health as they were at the time of lapse.

These liberal reinstatement provisions will remain in effect until August 1, 1947. Previously a deadline of February 1, 1947, had been set for such reinstatements on a comparative health basis.

Under the new law a veteran may obtain any permanent National Service Life Insurance plan from the VA without the necessity of previously holding term insurance.

Under the old law VA was required to issue National Service Life Insurance originally on a term plan only and it had to be carried on that basis for one year before it could be converted to a permanent plan.

The new act provides in certain cases for automatic conversion of term insurance to a permanent plan for policy holders who are totally disabled. Under the old law if they failed to convert within the term period their insurance protection ceased.

All National Service Life Insurance policies provide for a waiver of premiums for veterans who become totally disabled for six or more consecutive months. Even though premiums are being waived these veterans can convert their term policies to all type of permanent insurance except that for an endowment plan. The premiums will be waived during continuance of the total disability.

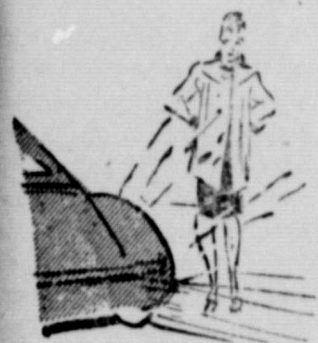

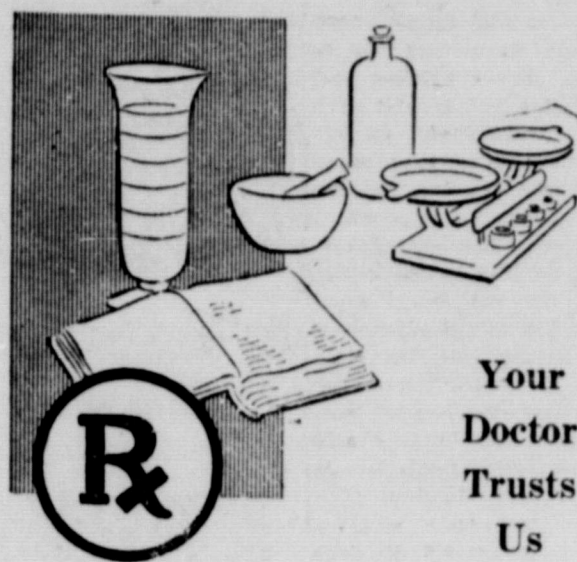

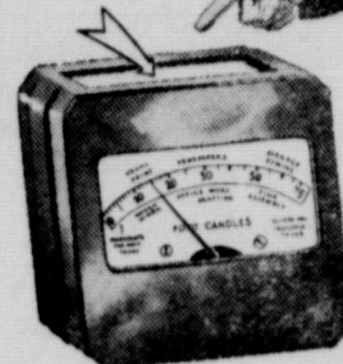

CUTTING US OUT

IN AN EFFORT to "cut down expenses," the Austin office of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission has ordered the Pampa office to discontinue taking claims from veterans and other civilians in McLean.

What does this mean? It means that in the future those people who filed for unemployment claims in McLean will have to go to Shamrock to place their claims. The News has no figures on the number of people who ordinarily file for the claims, but it is probably in the neighborhood of about 50 at a time.

In the past, the Pampa representative stopped here, and accepted the various claims, and those people who lived either in town or close to town did not have far to go. Now they will have to go to Shamrock to file their claims.

It is agreed that Shamrock isn't far away. But it should also be noted that the Pampa representative will, in all likelihood, pass through McLean on his way to Shamrock to accept claims from people in McLean. What we don't understand is where the expenses are going to be cut down to any extent. But we can easily figure out that those people who live here and go to Shamrock are going to be out money for the trip, even though it isn't far.

Another feature we don't like about it is that we know full well some of the people who go to Shamrock will be doing a bit of shopping while there. And that shopping would probably be done here—if those people hadn't found it necessary to make the Shamrock trip any way.

In other words, it's not only costing the people who file the claims, but also the McLean merchants. That's putting it frankly, and that's the way it meant it.

Now what's to be done about it? That is up to all of us. We realize that actually the change in the commission's policy isn't going to hurt any of us very badly. But we also realize it's another step towards losing some business and some prestige. The stopping point to this loss has got to come fairly soon, and it seems that now is the best time in the world to apply the brakes.

These are merely words. Action speaks much louder.

of it, I feel sure you will end in Amarillo with the



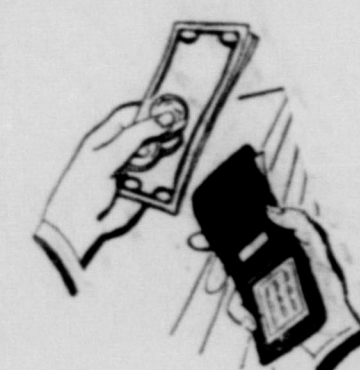
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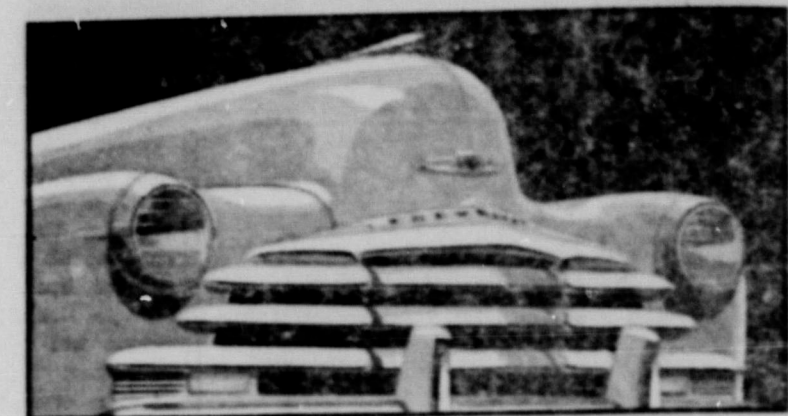
