Because of the economoic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menace to mankind long before their role as vectors of disease was under-Today at least six-diseases which Combed Poplin Use

are transmitted to man from the To Become Varied rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus, trichinosis, a form of jaundice, tapeworm, and food poisoning. The whole history of the rale rats play in the transmission of disease remains as yet unknown.

Chopper Thins 30 Acres Daily

thin up to 30 acres of young cotton a day is making its appearance on cotton belt farms this season for the first time, the National Cotton Council reports.

Another step toward complete mechanization of cotton production, the new chopper was invented by Riley Dabbs, Monroe County, Miss., farmer and sawmill operator.

Mr. Dabbs says that his machine which is tractor-powered, can be operated at a cost of \$7 per day. naking the cost of chopping an acre of cotton slightly more than 23 cents. Cost of hand chopping during recent seasons has been about \$4 per acre.
